1 (The meeting was called to order at 4:34 p.m.)

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. Let me start
3 with just the good news first. The good news is
4 the way the budget is formulated now, the
5 tentative budget relates to only a very small
6 change (Video Malfunction).

7 CLERK SADELI: Uh-oh.

8 MS. BRAATEN: Oh, he's gone. Could you
9 repeat that?

10 CLERK SADELI: Oh, Gary, you were gone for
11 a minute.

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Am I back?

13 CLERK SADELI: No, Gary Vegliante. Yeah,
14 you're back.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. The good news
16 is that we still -- we made it -- we came in
17 under the 2% cap, actually, about -- just about,
18 about 1.8%, one point -- we have about a \$4,000
19 difference between when we get to the 2%, when we
20 stay under it.

21 So, right now, the budget is formulated at
22 a -- at about a -- just about 1.8, so we're well
23 under the 2% cap, we're safe, and that's all good
24 news.

25 Our tax rate, also good news, last year was

1 .3182, and this year will only be .3190.

2 CLERK SADELI: That's great.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's really great.

4 It's a very minor change in the taxes, and it so
5 far looks as though it accommodates all the needs
6 of the Village.

7 The question marks we have in the Village,
8 of course, are -- the biggest issue is the -- in
9 the situation we're in with the Constables. As
10 you all know, we are negotiating with them.
11 Their attorney has, of course, threatened all
12 sorts of things and we're working through it.
13 But we've kept a raise value that was similar to
14 last year's in the budget for them, it's about
15 2.75. Our Attorney in that case feels that that
16 should be enough, that they wouldn't be getting
17 more than that even if it goes to arbitration.

18 So the way the budget is seated, it looks
19 as though we're very comfortable and safe with a
20 very small tax change, even though this year has
21 been very trying for us. We've got expensive
22 litigation, we've got expensive costs through the
23 year, but it looks like we're going to maintain
24 the budget at a very, very small change.

25 That's also with the, have to acknowledge,

1 for the -- for the security budget, for the
2 damage, extensive damage, \$300 on a home, right?

3 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yes, yes.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's with the \$300 per
5 home for the reserve fund for damages --

6 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Special assessment.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The special assessment
8 area.

9 So that's what I got to say, that's where
10 we're at. So we could go line by line if you'd
11 like.

12 TRUSTEE EFF: Is there any way to put the
13 budget up? I think there is, you know, on the
14 screen, and then we end up being around the
15 perimeter.

16 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, I don't think we
17 can do that.

18 CLERK SADELI: That's very high tech for me.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

20 TRUSTEE EFF: All right.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I have the budget right
22 in front of me.

23 CLERK SADELI: I could figure it out,
24 but --

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I have it. I have it,

1 looking right at it.

2 CLERK SADELI: I can figure that out for
3 April, for the April meeting, but I didn't --

4 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We sent it -- I sent
5 it out to everyone to look at and review.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You sure you don't have a
7 copy of the current budget on you?

8 TRUSTEE EFF: No, I do, but --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Well, then we'll
10 leave it that way.

11 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: So if anybody has any
12 questions or comments about the budget, we could
13 just look at it, and we can use this as the
14 tentative, and we can always change this before
15 the budget hearing.

16 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: No, but it looked good
17 to me. The question I have, quick one, is how
18 much additional revenue did we bring in from new
19 homes that were built in the Village last year?

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The assessment change is
21 only about -- the assessment change is about
22 \$8 million. Okay. We have -- last year, the
23 total assessment for the Village -- where is that
24 page? Last year, the total assessment for the
25 Village was -- let's see.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Five-fifty-seven.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: \$557,578,888, and this
3 year it's \$565,832,355.

4 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: That was -- that's on
5 the tax rate chart that I did, that's a tentative
6 chart as well. I figured that out so that you
7 could have the differences --

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, the separate --

9 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: -- between last year
10 and this year.

11 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: No, that's great. So
12 that makes that -- all the renovations and all of
13 the new, you know, tear-down and build-ups have
14 added to the Village.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: About 8 million bucks.

16 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: About 8 million, that's
17 pretty good

18 CLERK SADELI: Well, there are still more
19 that are still being worked on, too.

20 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, that haven't
21 had CO's yet.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You have to remember --

23 CLERK SADELI: That we haven't had yet.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- this is all -- this is
25 right until December 31st. The assessment only

1 goes until December 31st, so all the homes coming
2 online this year will be on next year's
3 assessment. We've already had one \$6 million
4 sale, and we have another one probably following
5 it this year. So with two sales alone, we're
6 going to have \$12 million more.

7 CLERK SADELI: That's great.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's very good.

9 TRUSTEE EFF: Are we allowing for some
10 additional dollars in the Building Inspector
11 budget based on all of the issues we had over the
12 last few years, you know, with litigation and,
13 you know --

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, we --

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: They're in separate
16 line items.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They're in separate line
18 items, John. What we have allotted --

19 TRUSTEE EFF: No, I know.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

21 TRUSTEE EFF: I don't have it in front of
22 me now, but I looked at it before, and it doesn't
23 look like we have --

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, the Building
25 Inspector number stays the same.

1 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, the Building
3 Inspector -- no, no. Let me -- let me address
4 what John was saying. We have the numbers in the
5 budget for the extraordinary charges, but the
6 Building Inspector has not expressed a need or a
7 want to go and get an increase in his salary.

8 TRUSTEE EFF: No, I'm not -- I'm not
9 talking about his salary, I'm talking --

10 CLERK SADELI: Any legal fees goes into a
11 different column.

12 TRUSTEE EFF: Right.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The legal fees and the
14 engineering fees remained high, higher than
15 usual, and that's where we have accommodated the
16 costs.

17 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: No. But, Gary, to that
18 point, we had discussed, you know, on different
19 occasions possibly bringing in someone to augment
20 the Code Enforcement --

21 TRUSTEE EFF: Right.

22 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- at specific times as
23 maybe a succession plan, or just another set of
24 eyes going forward. Should we consider that in
25 the budget?

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, no, wait, let me
2 answer that question. I don't think that we
3 should, because if we need to go to outside, we
4 should do it on -- we should buy it, we shouldn't
5 hire somebody. It's going to cost money.

6 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: No, I'm not talking
7 about buying it, Gary.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You should go outside
9 and get private -- you know, and then put in the
10 world and hire an expert specifically for what we
11 need him for.

12 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: No, I'm not talking
13 about hiring, I'm just talking about
14 appropriating the funds, so if we do go to hell,
15 we have it.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. Guys, if you look
17 at the engineering line, which is at the bottom
18 of Page 2, we've -- we've only spent
19 9,986 dollars -- 85 dollars in engineering, we
20 budgeted 18,000, so there's a significant buffer
21 there.

22 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: That's perfect. That's
23 what I'm talking about, yeah. Thank you.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: So, with that being said, is
25 the engineer line in addition to the Building

1 Inspector? Are they kind of together? I don't
2 have it in front of me, so --

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, they're not.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They're separate.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It's got a separate
6 line item for his salary. And what they're
7 talking about is on Page 2.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Page 2 at the bottom.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right. It's \$18,000.
10 We've only spent about 10,000 to date.

11 CLERK SADELI: All right. Can I just say
12 one thing?

13 TRUSTEE EFF: No, I saw that earlier on the
14 Engineer line.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right.

16 CLERK SADELI: Just when we're speaking, we
17 have to just speak one at a time, because Lucia
18 can only -- you know, she sees our names and
19 she's typing as she sees people talk.

20 MS. BRAATEN: Thank you.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll try hard to do
22 that.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: All right. Well, we
24 answered the question.

25 CLERK SADELI: Yeah.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I think so. I
2 think we're safe, John.

3 TRUSTEE EFF: What would happen -- let me
4 provide a scenario. What would happen if
5 Bob Kalfur decides to totally retire? What do we
6 do?

7 CLERK SADELI: He's not.

8 TRUSTEE EFF: No, I mean, seriously.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, listen, any --

10 MR. PROKOP: He's got at least 10 more
11 years.

12 (Laughter)

13 TRUSTEE EFF: Don't be too sure.

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What do we do? Come,
15 on, what do we do? What kind -- what kind of
16 question is that? We'll hire another guy.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll get another guy.
18 It's not easy, John. You know, I've been
19 asking --

20 TRUSTEE EFF: I know, I know.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: First of all, the
22 certifications are very extensive. Bob has been
23 going to school from the year before he started
24 as Building Inspector. So getting someone with
25 the certifications is not easy. But for the

1 interim, we would use the Engineering line to
2 hire basically Engineers and Architects to
3 oversee it. But it would be very difficult if
4 Bob were quickly to decide to retire, which may
5 happen, you never know. I mean --

6 TRUSTEE EFF: That's exactly why I'm
7 bringing it up.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well --

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We could always go to
10 an Architect or an Engineer --

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- and have them do a
13 framing inspection, a roughing inspection --

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- whatever you need.

16 TRUSTEE EFF: I know that.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We could hire them.

18 TRUSTEE EFF: I know that. I am an
19 Engineer, I know that.

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay, so --

21 TRUSTEE EFF: I understand. I know how
22 those things can happen.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What that --

24 TRUSTEE EFF: And I also how they can't
25 happen.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. So John is asking
2 for somebody with a crystal ball. We don't have
3 a crystal ball.

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We don't, right.

5 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We have money --

7 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay. I made --

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We have money in the
9 budget.

10 TRUSTEE EFF: All right. I made the point.
11 I don't think you need a crystal ball, it's just
12 gut feel, but we'll move on.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Hopefully, yeah.
14 Hopefully, Bob will be with us for a while
15 longer.

16 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: So, Gary, that --
17 basically, at about 200 an hour, the
18 engineering's outside it if we need that type of
19 augmentation --

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Hold on.

21 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- that's 90 hours.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

23 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: All right. Thanks.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So right now we're
25 running on about 20 hours a week. That's what we

1 have in the budget. Bob is budgeted at 20 hours
2 a week. So if he retires, the balance of his
3 salary would go, plus the engineering costs.

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'll tell you what else
5 you can do, you can look in the surrounding areas
6 for Southampton or --

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yep.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- this guy Houlihan,
9 and you could give them a few bucks to come and
10 do some -- whatever he needs to do.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Exactly. There are
12 Building Inspectors --

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: This is not a big
14 problem that I see any foreseeable problem with
15 or without Bob Kalfur in the future.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. Basically, there
17 are other Building Inspectors that will do per
18 diem --

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That's right.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- work. It's just, you
21 know, I kind of questioned around. Nobody's
22 jumping at the chance to come into West Hampton
23 Dunes, for some reason. They ask --

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Because we have a
25 Building Inspector.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, not only that, but
2 he has deal with all the litigation we're going
3 through, because of a couple of litigate --
4 lawsuits. But we'll --

5 TRUSTEE EFF: Thank you. Duly noted.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. I mean, we could
7 always -- you know, I don't want to increase the
8 budget.

9 TRUSTEE EFF: Right.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: But I think right now
11 we're --

12 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Gary, as long as you
13 feel that the 90 hours is sufficient for you to
14 go outside, if Bob has another, you know, knee
15 injury where's he's out --

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, right.

17 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- you know, two
18 months, three months, that you're able to
19 backfill and you feel comfortable, then that's
20 okay with me.

21 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Bob Kalfur would
22 probably give reasonable notice.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. No, I think so.
24 But what we've -- what I've seen in the industry
25 is when other Building Inspectors do per diem,

1 they're usually around \$100 an hour.

2 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Well, that gives us 180
3 hours, so --

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

5 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- great.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You know, we're all
7 right, I think we'll be all right. But it is
8 what it is. I mean, if worse comes to worst,
9 we'll have to find the money, or tell guys they
10 can't build.

11 (Laughter)

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Well, there's not much
13 for us to build lately.

14 TRUSTEE EFF: That's what we never want to
15 say.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, we never do want to
17 say that.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Let's keep it moving.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

20 CLERK SADELI: Yeah.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We've kept the income
22 pretty close to what it was last year, so --

23 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, Mike had a
24 recommendation.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: On the fines and
2 forfeitures, he was thinking because we hadn't
3 received as much in the years past, to reduce it
4 to 15,000 instead of the 8.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe, I think that you
6 could comment on this. I'm hopeful that this
7 June, if the elections are -- continue to be
8 scheduled for June, I'm hopeful that we'll have a
9 new Judge. I'm going to make an endorsement to
10 one of our residents, Adam Goldman, who's been a
11 very good resident and friend. And I asked him
12 if he would be interested in serving the Village,
13 he said definitely, he would do it. And I'm
14 enthusiastic, because if we have a new Judge,
15 we'd have a much more equitable -- it's very
16 difficult to discuss this in an open forum.

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We understand, Gary, we
18 know what you're trying to say, right.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'm hoping that with a
20 change of venue and a new Judge, and, you know,
21 maybe a new initiated Constabulary, we'll
22 maintain at least -- at least a break-even point,
23 because right now the courts are costing us more
24 than we're what -- than they're bringing in.
25 What do you think, Joe?

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Definitely. I think that
2 the -- a new -- you know, a new view of the
3 process of settling these, resolving the tickets
4 would definitely increase the revenues that are
5 coming out of the court.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

7 ATTORNEY PROKOP: You'll notice that
8 immediately.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I think so.

10 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Joe. Joe, it's Michael.
11 When is the next court date, or do we not know?

12 (Laughter)

13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, it just got bumped
14 from April until May, so it depends on whether or
15 not the Village Hall in Westhampton Beach is open
16 in May.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: If the Village Hall --

18 TRUSTEE CRAIG: When was the last court
19 date?

20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: December.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: And, roughly, what did the
23 backlog look like for cases?

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We don't know.

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: There's not a lot of

1 tickets that are during the year, so there's not
2 really a backlog at all, maybe a few.

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: All right. Then I suggest
4 we move to \$15,000 from 18,000 for the year.

5 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Does everyone
7 agree there?

8 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Good with me.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

10 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll make the
12 adjustment. That will improve our bottom line,
13 not that --

14 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Now, the other
15 question was -- we jumped down to the mortgage
16 tax. I'm just jumping, because these are the
17 questions. We did receive three mortgage tax --

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Checks.

19 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: -- checks in the
20 amount of about 9,000, 10,000, 11,000, and we're
21 due for another one that should probably be
22 another 11,000. So we're in the area of 33, 32,
23 and we're at -- the year before, we had received
24 43,000, that's why we kept the amount at 45 for
25 the income. But when speaking to Mike earlier,

1 he thinks that everyone's going to be refinancing
2 and taking mortgages because of the interest
3 rates. So if that's the case, it depends on
4 Suffolk County and our share. So I'm not sure if
5 we want to keep that number at 45 or not.

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think we should leave
7 it there.

8 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: That's what -- yeah,
9 that's what we thought.

10 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I think I would vote for
11 leaving it.

12 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think a lot of people
14 are going to be remortgaging their homes and
15 entering into the market.

16 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's free money these
18 days.

19 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yep, right.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Basically. So I think it
21 will be -- I think it's safe. All right?

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay. So then
23 wherever anybody feels they want to jump in here
24 just going down line items, I mean, it's
25 pretty -- it's pretty clear-cut.

1 The situation with the Municipal Court,
2 that one level of 17,000 was actually the Clerk
3 at \$12,000 and the Justice for 5,000. So that
4 was just --

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's the Village --
6 that's the Court Clerk.

7 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, the Court
8 Clerk.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The title, you got a
10 single down there.

11 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: It was 12,000 and
12 5,000. But now the Court Clerk asked for a
13 \$2,000 increase. And because everything is
14 changing with the courts, and the Judge has to be
15 there twice as much, we were thinking of
16 increasing it a bit to get someone that might be
17 interested.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The State has mandated
19 that Village Court be held twice a month now,
20 because of evidentiary laws. Well, it's being
21 argued for the Village's behalf by NYCOM to have
22 them reduced back to once a month. Right now,
23 we're looking at twice a month for Village Court.
24 Regardless of how many cases we have left, we're
25 going to have to meet.

1 So I think that being said, the Judge only
2 getting paid \$5,000, I think we have to double
3 it. It's going to be 24 times a year, it's going
4 to be meeting, because the new Judge will not be
5 taking off January, February and March and April.
6 He'll be running court almost every month, or at
7 least once a month, see how it goes. So we
8 thought we had to do that, I don't think there's
9 any way around that. And the Court Clerk
10 deserves a \$2,000 raise, she hasn't gotten a
11 raise in three years.

12 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, and she's going
13 to be there double time as well.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

15 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Do we get access to the
16 courtroom for the extra time per month?

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, they haven't really
18 asked yet, so.

19 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, we haven't --
20 they were charging us \$250 a month.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: A month.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: I'm not sure if
23 they're going to change that. I don't -- I
24 don't -- we didn't get --

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Let me ask a question.

1 Do we need to have the Judge that many times?

2 Are we that busy?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, but we may be
4 mandated by law, Gary. New evidentiary laws are
5 indicating that the courts have to meet.

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The law is --

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We're trying to get
8 that --

9 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The law is now that you
10 have to -- a defendant has to be arraigned within
11 15 days of the date that the ticket is issued, so
12 the possibility is that we could have to meet
13 more than once a month.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. NYCOM is
15 advocating for us, while the law is intact the
16 way it is, that we meet, that we actually open
17 the court twice a month. That may not carry
18 through, but I think in order to be safe, we have
19 to do it.

20 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Gary, will that double
21 our Constable cost for attending court twice a
22 month?

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Sure.

24 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: They need to be present
25 as well?

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

2 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: So that's going to have
3 an impact on their -- their salary adjustment as
4 well.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, the salary, yeah,
6 but it's not that many hours, but it will have
7 some impact.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Don't they do that as
9 part of their tour duty, or is that in addition
10 to what they earn, you know, what they earn? Are
11 they doing it on the clock, where they're already
12 on the clock, or they're doing it --

13 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah. According to
14 their handbook, they're guaranteed three hours
15 just for showing up, and then six hours if it
16 goes a little bit further.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, that's if
18 they're -- that's if they're being tried, if
19 their case is being tried, in other words, with
20 their evidence.

21 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yes.

22 CLERK SADELI: We lost Joe.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe, we lost you at the
24 most important part. I don't believe -- I don't
25 feel it will be significant, because the number

1 of cases that get tried are small. Mostly cases
2 get pled out, and that's what we're hoping, we
3 have a cooperative Judge, that he presents them
4 an opportunity to speak, though, they plead out
5 early, and that's it. We're -- the revenue is
6 still intact and the officers were not mandated
7 to stay. I don't think it will be terrible.

8 What's the matter, Mike?

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Nothing. I'm just moving
10 out of the room, I'm going to my office.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

12 TRUSTEE CRAIG: The kids are taking -- the
13 kids are taking over the kitchen.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay, no problem.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Angela is --

16 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Did Joe come back?

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You're off the screen --

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Where's Brian?

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- because moving is
20 making you --

21 CLERK SADELI: Brian's outside with the
22 baby and the dog is howling. I'm surprised you
23 guys can't hear him.

24 (Laughter)

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Hey, are we going to

1 get bounced off of this in 40 minutes?

2 CLERK SADELI: No, I subscribed.

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Joe's back.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You back, Joe? All
5 right. What else? Where are we going next?

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Well, we were in the
7 courts.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right, Municipal Court.

9 CLERK SADELI: I don't see Joe.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, he's not back.

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: All right. He'll call
12 back.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Let's go to another
15 section.

16 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Well, let's talk -- let's
17 talk about the Law budget while he's gone.

18 (Laughter)

19 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: I left it the same.

20 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We kept it at 115, I think
21 that's good.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. I think that's
24 good, because we actually -- with all the
25 litigation we've had this year, which has been

1 significant, we haven't really capped it. So I
2 think -- I think we're close, but I think we'll
3 be all right.

4 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Good. And any shortfall
5 this year that spills over to next year, we'll
6 have some extra.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. We can move it on
8 for the last two months.

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The lawyers will hold
11 their breath. If they don't like it, then
12 we'll --

13 TRUSTEE EFF: The additional, the
14 additional legal services --

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, Joe -- oh, yeah, I'm
16 sorry, John.

17 TRUSTEE EFF: Additional legal service we
18 had to get from outside, is that covered within
19 the Legal budget?

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

21 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yes, it's all in
22 there.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Any legal payments, any
24 payments we make to the lawyers is exposed in the
25 budgets, that's right. However, some of the

1 legal expense was covered by our insurance.

2 TRUSTEE EFF: How much?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't know offhand. I
4 do know that our budget, we are --

5 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, no, because it --
6 they go directly to the insurance.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They go directly to the
8 insurance.

9 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, we've never even seen
10 a bill.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We don't see those bills.
12 Well, we do know that we have not spent the
13 entire 115,000 yet this year in our budget.

14 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Close.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, we are close. One
16 more month, and the next month, halfway.

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: So maybe move to Page 3?

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yep.

19 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah. Just quick on
20 the Law budget. Gary, this is just strictly
21 Joe's time and not outside counsel?

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: No.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No.

24 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, that's --

25 CLERK SADELI: That's everything.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All the counsels.

2 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: This is all counsel.
3 So would the BID counsel be included in this as
4 well?

5 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, no, no, BID is
6 separate, that's totally separate.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, but some of Joe's
8 billed for that.

9 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No. Anything that he
10 did for the BID is not included.

11 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Every outside counsel
12 that we had for the BID is also separate.

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yes

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, yeah.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yes. That's not in
16 here. I'm just talking about the other --

17 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: No. Excellent. No,
18 that's perfect.

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: And the BID, the BID
20 got a heavy hit there for around twenty-something
21 thousand dollars.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Twenty-three thousand.

23 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah, I wonder why. Yeah.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Thank you, David Grant.

25 All right. Where are we at? Next page,

1 Building Inspector

2 TRUSTEE CRAIG: On Page 3. Our insurance
3 went up by 5,000?

4 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, they're
5 estimating possibly seven to nine, so I just put
6 it up, you know, in the event we need it. I
7 don't know.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They've been very good.
9 Their estimates are usually --

10 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Usually, they're on a
11 higher --

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They're on a higher.

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: They're lower than
14 the estimates.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

16 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: But I like to put it
17 in there in case we have to go there. And the
18 Constables, I just did a basic, what we had said
19 earlier.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: 2.75.

21 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, 2.75. And they
22 have a new line --

23 TRUSTEE CRAIG: There's Joe.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What?

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Joe is back.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We have a new line
2 item for a new vehicle, because once we switch
3 the vehicles and whatnot, they usually have to
4 put the equipment in and everything, so we put an
5 extra amount in there for that. And then just
6 utilities in general, and then they have two
7 extra phones now that they have to have, so I put
8 2200 in there. So their budget changed a total
9 of 9,000.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Why did they need two
11 extra phones?

12 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: They need them for
13 their --

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Because of the new
15 evidentiary laws, we're concerned that they --
16 that they could subpoena the use of their own
17 phone for the evidentiary laws. So we got them a
18 new phone that's a single-use phone, which if
19 they subpoena, it will be much easier to --

20 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: They don't have to
21 give up their personal phones.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I know. It would
23 be much easier to transcribe the information. It
24 will ultimately save us money. Every, every
25 department has done that. And besides, we, you

1 know --

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Oh, okay. I just was
3 curious.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, yeah.

5 CLERK SADELI: And I think that they were
6 getting calls at different hours, Brian had said,
7 and they needed to not use their personal phones.
8 So they were getting calls at night and they both
9 needed the phone for --

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I don't blame them,
11 they should have their --

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- separate phone,
14 yeah.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: These new evidentiary
16 laws have been very costly to the Village. It's
17 going to be very, very expensive. Areas like in
18 Freeport, New York, in Freeport, Long Island,
19 their budget is being impacted by the new
20 evidentiary laws alone well over 2 1/2 million
21 bucks. Imagine that? It's just -- it's been
22 unconscionable and very difficult to deal with.

23 But I think we're good on every -- on
24 the -- they really haven't looked for much more,
25 just the salaries, that's it.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: If that's fine, then
 2 we can jump down. The snow removal stayed the
 3 same as it was last year, which was 15,000. When
 4 we did the budget last year, we weren't sure if
 5 they were going to increase it or not. We had
 6 18,000. So we just removed the 3,000, so we have
 7 3,000 extra there.

8 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: That's excellent.

9 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: And --

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. Well, we had no
 11 snow.

12 (Laughter)

13 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Still a good bet.
 14 Still a good bet.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: That was actually
 16 before the season, because we didn't get the
 17 snow. So they really can't --

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They gave it
 19 consideration before the season started.

20 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, right.

21 CLERK SADELI: Yeah.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: And then when we go
 23 to the -- where am I? I lost my spot here.
 24 Something about the -- oh, the next page, I'm
 25 sorry.

1 The Recreation, I know someone was asking
2 about the movie and we still have 3,000 -- we
3 still have 3,000 in there for the movie. I don't
4 know if you wanted to do a second movie or what
5 you thought about that.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You know, not only do we
7 have the big new beach out there, between it, we
8 could have two new movies.

9 CLERK SADELI: You think that's smart for
10 this year? We don't even know when we would be
11 able to schedule those.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, we can't make a
14 move like that this year.

15 CLERK SADELI: Maybe next year.

16 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: I don't think we have
17 to this year.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Unless we can get private
19 contractors to maybe contribute, I would leave it
20 out.

21 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah. If they still
22 have social distancing in place, it will be
23 another number.

24 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Right.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

1 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Hey, Gary, speaking to
2 that, going back to supplies for public safety,
3 should we build in for PPEs and masks and
4 additional supplies for the guys?

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, they have the
6 supplies now. They do have PPEs at this time,
7 but they're going to need to bump up. So I think
8 they feel they can do it with the equipment.

9 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah. They gave us
10 this budget before we had this situation, so that
11 might have to go up a little again.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'll check with them, and
13 if they need to go up, it will be -- I'll send it
14 out to everybody what their -- what their
15 request is.

16 CLERK SADELI: I think that they also
17 requested supplies from the County. And I saw an
18 email from Brian that said he went and picked
19 those up --

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

21 CLERK SADELI: -- yesterday.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. We're getting some
23 support from the County on this, I believe,
24 anyway.

25 Okay. Everything else looks good.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay. And then the
2 retirement, it could -- I got an estimate of like
3 127, but that was just a guesstimate as of
4 August. So, usually, it's a little bit more, so
5 I made it one-third in the event of a situation.
6 It seems as though with the Social Security,
7 we've been on target or around that now, and
8 it's --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We've been right on that.

10 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, it's been right
11 on, so I didn't want to change that.

12 The Worker's Comp, actually, I think should
13 go down slightly. So I adjusted that, because we
14 haven't had as much cost as they initially
15 thought. And I think it's supposed to hold for
16 like --

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Two years.

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Two years.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think they hold it for
20 two years.

21 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, wait a second,
22 it should be a little bit more. I might want to
23 make that twelve-five.

24 CLERK SADELI: I think when we looked at
25 it, that was the 15 to 30% risk.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What is that now? What
4 subject is this, which line item?

5 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Worker's Comp.

6 CLERK SADELI: Worker's Comp.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Page 4, Worker's Comp.

8 We have --

9 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, but see, it was
10 twelve-thirty -- twelve-two-thirty-eight for this
11 past year, so I think we want to make it at least
12 twelve-five. So it would be, you know, a
13 slight --

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Three hundred dollars,
15 yeah.

16 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, do that, make it
18 twelve-five.

19 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: And then the hospital
20 and medical, it seems that that's been holding
21 its own. I don't know if it's going to change,
22 the self-insured. We don't have any estimates.
23 They don't put anything in here, it's a real
24 guesstimate on our part. But the fact that the
25 Constables have to pay into it, it's changed it,

1 you know, quite a bit.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, yeah.

3 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: So I think we should,
4 you know, pull back.

5 And then the bond actually went down a bit,
6 and the interest for the bond. So, you know,
7 those items are down as much, too.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: How much would you pull
9 back on the insurance?

10 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: What do you mean,
11 for --

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: On the --

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Worker's Comp?

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, I'm going to
16 put it twelve-five instead of \$200.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We're going -- right,
18 \$300.

19 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, just \$300.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, right now.

21 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

23 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Claire, going back to
24 Workman's Comp --

25 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

1 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- if we lose three or
2 four to the virus, is that under Workman's Comp,
3 or is that just full reimbursement from the
4 State?

5 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: I have no clue.

6 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, I don't know how that
7 works.

8 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, we're not sure
9 how anything works. I mean, they're throwing
10 everything out there at us, but we just don't
11 know how it works until they figure it out.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: There's a lot of money
13 from the State and the Federal Government on
14 this, so I don't think they'll leave us hanging,
15 especially the First Responders.

16 ATTORNEY PROKOP: It will be --

17 TRUSTEE EFF: I just didn't know if we
18 should put something in there, a little extra
19 just in case.

20 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Joe was saying
21 something. What did you say, Joe?

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The cost, if we -- if we
23 keep track of the cost and itemize them, they'll
24 be reimbursed by FEMA.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We had -- we had tried.

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You know, they've
3 actually asked us initially for our report.

4 TRUSTEE EFF: The other thing is are we
5 going to be restricted from doing construction
6 work on the new Constable's Headquarters because
7 of the recent government -- Governor, you know,
8 order?

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No. All the trades
10 right now throughout the state are operating,
11 electricians, plumbers, carpenters. They have
12 not restricted them yet.

13 TRUSTEE EFF: I thought that -- I thought
14 the Governor just issued something.

15 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: He did, not --

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Inspectors.

17 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, look, we got the
19 call on that. If it's required to be -- first of
20 all, I think we're exempt, because that would be
21 a required health and safety issue. A new
22 Constabulary would be considered under that
23 edict.

24 But as far as general construction in the
25 Village, if it's considered essential to health,

1 safety or welfare -- for example, we have a house
2 in the Village where the owner tore the bathrooms
3 out to renovate and the bathrooms were ripped
4 apart. Now he would be entitled to repair those
5 bathrooms because he needs to reside in that
6 home, and it's essential to his -- to the use of
7 his home.

8 Also, we had a situation where a house,
9 having the third floor constructed, the next door
10 neighbor called to complain. He went and got a
11 letter from his engineer and/or architect
12 claiming that it's a public safety issue, because
13 if the -- in a high wind zone where we are, that,
14 of course, there's a risk of that portion being
15 blown apart. They need to secure it, so they're
16 exempt.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You know, I haven't
18 even -- I haven't even seen these bigger jobs in
19 the city shutting down.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

21 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I see -- I see 40, 50,
22 60 guys in a building.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, but as of
24 yesterday, Gary, the Governor's edict is to stop
25 it all.

1 TRUSTEE EFF: Yep, yep.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Except essential work.

3 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah. The point, the point
4 is regarding 656A.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

6 TRUSTEE EFF: Would it be prudent for us to
7 be knocking that building down, whenever that is,
8 during this period of the Coronavirus? Would we
9 be -- would we be fiscally and otherwise
10 responsible to be doing that if it's --

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, I -- why? I think --
12 I think what we're going to do is we're going to
13 put the bid -- the job out to bid, and when we
14 award the bid, it will be removed, the house will
15 be removed.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, we do everything
17 at once.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, right.

19 TRUSTEE EFF: No, no. No, no, I'm not
20 saying that. All I'm saying is that if this --
21 for Coronavirus, and it will continue for May and
22 probably into early June --

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: -- but not -- we don't see
25 us use -- I'm sorry -- doing any construction or

1 demolition at that site before June, correct?

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Not until the bids are
3 out. So the bid's not even out yet, it will be a
4 while. But when the bids come in, then we'll
5 decide at that point whether we should go
6 forward.

7 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay. Do you think it might
8 be wise, not even knowing yet what impact it's
9 going to have on the Village with the
10 Coronavirus, to possibly commission that little
11 building in a small way to have it as a -- let's
12 say, an ad hoc Village building to be used in the
13 summer, not knowing what we're going to get with
14 the Coronavirus with traffic? I don't know, just
15 a whole bunch of --

16 TRUSTEE CRAIG: John, the building's ridden
17 with mold, it can't be used for anything else.

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: And I don't think you
19 want people congregating anywhere.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We don't want anybody --
21 we have 906. Well, we have 914.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We can't even go in
23 there right now.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We have -- we have space
25 we can use.

1 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I mean, I think --
3 besides, it's not a budget issue. We could
4 discuss that at another time.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Let's just stick with
6 the budget. Let's stay on --

7 TRUSTEE EFF: We are.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Let's finish with this
9 budget.

10 TRUSTEE EFF: We are. Let me ask the
11 question. How are we covering -- right now, is
12 it through one of the bonds that we're covering
13 the construction of the new Constabulary? Right
14 now, is there any -- in other words, I'm just
15 trying to get an answer on how the construction
16 is being financially covered for the new building
17 at 656. Is it in one of the budget lines, the
18 debt service, or whatever? I don't know, I'm
19 asking.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: There is no line right
21 now, because we don't have a number. We don't
22 know what -- we don't have the bids.

23 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: It's going to be in
24 next year's budget.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: When we get the bids,

1 we'll publish them. When we accept and award the
2 bid, we then go to bond market. That will be in
3 next year's budget.

4 TRUSTEE EFF: So how do we pay for the
5 architect, and out of which budget line is that
6 coming out of right now?

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The architect is paid up
8 to date, but whatever would come out would come
9 out of the professional services.

10 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's already in the
12 budget, that's all taken care of.

13 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Hey, Gary.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

15 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: The franchise tax --
16 and, Claire, you as well. The franchise tax that
17 we have at 16,000 and change, is that in synch
18 with the -- with the FTC? So if they ask -- you
19 know, these utilities request a rating hike and
20 they get it, do we get it on the utility side as
21 well?

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's very strictly
23 controlled by the Federal Government, by the
24 Federal and State government. We've been asking
25 for an increase in this every year. Nobody's

1 gotten it throughout the State.

2 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, we did get a
3 little bit, but then we got --

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We got it last year
5 because of the new -- because of the new -- maybe
6 now with 5G going on the individual poles.

7 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah. You would think
8 if Verizon and AT&T got a bump from the FTC, got
9 their two or three percent, we'd be entitled to
10 the two or three percent as well on the utility
11 side.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You would think that.

13 (Laughter)

14 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Just a thought.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. We aren't --

16 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The franchise, if I'm not
17 mistaken, is paid by Cablevision. And there is
18 an assessment to Verizon and also to LIPA, but
19 they've never paid it. We should -- one of these
20 days, when we have a break from other litigation,
21 we should sue Verizon and try to get that money.
22 But that's the answer. What's called franchise
23 comes from Cablevision and it's regulated by the
24 Public Service Commission, not the FTC.

25 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: When does their
3 contract come up?

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think we have about
5 another year-and-a-half, two years.

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah, I think, actually,
7 it's pretty soon, right.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

9 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I think we're going to
10 have notice from that.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

12 TRUSTEE EFF: But did we ever bill them?

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We get paid.

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We get paid, yeah.

15 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, all right. But did we
16 ever -- I mean, before we talk about litigation,
17 have we ever just followed up with a phone call?

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes. Yeah.

19 (Laughter)

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They're very cooperative,
21 John.

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah.

23 TRUSTEE EFF: I'm well aware.

24 CLERK SADELI: Are you talking about the
25 franchise?

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

2 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah.

3 CLERK SADELI: We send them a bill and they
4 pay us what they want.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right, that's it.

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: They thought that was
7 pretty funny.

8 CLERK SADELI: They don't even pay at least
9 what we charge them.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: NYCOM is working on it.
11 It's a problem throughout the state, and we're
12 trying to get somebody to listen. But even with
13 the power of NYCOM, they don't, they just don't
14 respond, you know, they do what they want.

15 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah. No, I understand.

16 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So the equipment, the
17 utility equipment in the Village actually gets
18 assessed every year --

19 TRUSTEE EFF: Right.

20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- the same way that
21 houses get assessed.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: And Angela does do the
24 work for that, but they -- the other ones, other
25 than Cablevision, have refused to pay. So it's

1 not unique to us, it's everybody has the problem,
2 and we're working on it.

3 TRUSTEE EFF: Order of magnitude, Angela,
4 how much is the franchise tax dollars that are
5 due us, order of magnitude, do you know?

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Sixteen thousand? It's
7 on the --

8 CLERK SADELI: Maybe 16 to 20,000.

9 TRUSTEE EFF: Sixteen thousand.

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Sixteen thousand.

12 TRUSTEE EFF: A year.

13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: You mean, the Verizon --

14 TRUSTEE EFF: A year.

15 CLERK SADELI: And it's usually -- CFC
16 Holdings, I think that's Verizon who pays that.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

18 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: So, Angela, for the
19 record, that number is (800)342-3355.

20 (Laughter)

21 CLERK SADELI: I'll call them up.

22 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: That's the Public
23 Service Commission's, the New York State Public
24 Service Commission's number.

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We've already gone there

1 before, hearings, and it's a mess. It's not --

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We've actually driven to
3 Albany, Joe and I, on several occasions and sat
4 there, let's do it, make testimony, were thanked
5 very much, and walked out and got nothing.

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We went up to litigate it
7 once in their headquarters in New York City, and
8 Bruno --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yep.

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Bruno saved the day for
11 us, but we don't have that weapon anymore.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No. But it's a common
13 question asked by most Mayors, and NYCOM is
14 addressing it, and they're just -- they're
15 working very hard not to give us anything. Some
16 day maybe we'll get the money.

17 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So, John --

18 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: If they have the
19 resources.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

21 ATTORNEY PROKOP: If John Eff's question
22 was the -- how much is the bill, did you mean the
23 bill for Verizon or the bill for Cablevision?

24 TRUSTEE EFF: Well, both, really.

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, Cablevision's bill

1 is paid every year. That's -- Angela said that's
2 approximately 15.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Fifteen thousand.

4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Fifteen thousand.

5 TRUSTEE EFF: All right.

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Verizon is a few hundred
7 dollars.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, it's not much.

9 TRUSTEE EFF: And then what is LIPA's bill?

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: A few, a few hundred
11 dollars.

12 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, small, very small,
13 couple of hundred.

14 TRUSTEE EFF: All right.

15 CLERK SADELI: Maybe not even 200.

16 TRUSTEE EFF: So, really, the one that's
17 not paying is Verizon

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

19 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay.

20 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Everyone's online.
21 Everyone does wireless, so a wired connection,
22 there's probably nobody using it.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. Well, with the
24 5Gs now, that's going to be on every individual
25 pole. There may be something we could do with

1 that.

2 ATTORNEY PROKOP: There was just a Federal
3 Court ruling that we're allowed to tax the --

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- the 5Gs, so we'll be
6 able to do that.

7 TRUSTEE EFF: Yep.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So that may work out for
9 us, that may provide more income. Okay.

10 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Are we good?

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Sounds good to me.

12 Everybody all right?

13 TRUSTEE CRAIG: When is our next meeting?

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I just wanted --

15 CLERK SADELI: April 13th.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: April 13th.

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Is it going to be on this?

18 CLERK SADELI: Yes.

19 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Just so this --

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I believe it will be a
21 Zoom meeting.

22 CLERK SADELI: Same, the same, yep.

23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Can I mention a couple of
24 things?

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, but wait. That

1 meeting will be open to the public, so we could
2 have quite a few participants then; is that
3 right, Joe?

4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

5 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: This one was, too,
6 right?

7 CLERK SADELI: This one was, too, yes.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

9 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: That's Easter Monday.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. Well, it is what
11 it is. It has to be done by the 15th.

12 CLERK SADELI: Right.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I thought this meeting
14 would have been jammed with people with nothing do.

15 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Nobody's cares.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Nobody cares. Look at
17 the beach. Gary, you've been looking at the
18 beach. What do you think?

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think it's great.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's unbelievable,
21 isn't it?

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You could see right
23 around where I live that there was approximately
24 a 12 to 14-foot drop --

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yep.

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- in the toe of the
2 dune. We didn't lose any dune in that area.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No.

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: And after they
5 replenished, I think it's down to about four,
6 five feet.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And a couple of more
8 months of westerly winds, it will be almost right
9 back to where it was.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I built the walk-over,
11 it's already getting buried.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yes.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think the walk, from
15 the end of your walkway to the water is a long
16 walk --

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yes.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- down.

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah.

20 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Hey, Gary. Gary, I brought
21 this up at the last meeting, and we've talked
22 about this. You know, they did the replenishment
23 at Shinnecock, and I looked at the aerial
24 photographs and they've got snow fence from one
25 end all the way to Peconic, Ponquogue. Why can't

1 we have a snow fence installed by the Village to
2 preserve all that. So I know you've said Fish
3 and Wildlife, but why do they get to do it in
4 Hampton Bays and we can't do it? They're doing
5 up on Fire Island, Long Beach.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, no. First of all,
7 it's 180 grand, that's the cost.

8 TRUSTEE CRAIG: All right. Set that aside.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. Putting that
10 aside, Fish and Wildlife has been very aggressive
11 about stopping us. As a matter of fact, as I
12 told you, Mike, both Congressman Bishop and now
13 Legislator -- Congressman Zeldin have advocated
14 for it, got it approved, and they stopped it both
15 times. I think now, with Trump in office, we may
16 have a little more leverage, they may have a
17 little less leverage. We may be able to petition
18 them. You know, it's just been tough to reach
19 these guys now.

20 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Who's going to stop us if
21 we start to put it in? If they're putting it in
22 everywhere, why are they specifically focusing on
23 us. It seems like --

24 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: I've been doing it for
25 the last 10 years, Michael, and no one's ever

1 stopped me. The only impact I had was when a
2 nor'easter came and washed it away, you know, my
3 hundred, you know, something feet of fencing, and
4 then I would just go right back to Speonk, pick
5 up another couple of rolls and put it right back
6 up. Even Fish and Wildlife worked their entrance
7 around my fencing every year, never had an issue.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think their positions
9 have changed, but what -- I've gotten a lot of
10 calls from residents who said they'd be willing
11 to do it themselves. You know, there's a lot of
12 new residents on the beach and they'd be willing
13 to participate. I'd like to try to get them to
14 do it first before we spend 180 grand.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I wouldn't do it right
16 now with the season --

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- with the birds
19 coming up. But after, after the -- you know,
20 after the season's over, you know, sure.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I think we keep talking
23 about -- I mean, we just spent -- the Federal
24 Government spent \$21 million dollars on cleaning
25 that beach up there. I think spending 180,000

1 grand to ensure the extra create dunes, as has
2 been done in the past, seems like a small ask.
3 Maybe we can get the State or the Feds to
4 partially fund it, FEMA.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, I think we may be
6 able to, but we got -- I'd really like to try to
7 get residents, individual residents. If they all
8 did their own home --

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Right, 100%.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. We're not talking
11 about a lot of money, but for us to do it, it's a
12 lot of money.

13 TRUSTEE CRAIG: No, I understand, but --

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The last -- the last time
15 we tried to do that, the DEC came in. The
16 difference -- and stopped it.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Fish and Wildlife.

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The difference is that
19 the beach in front of our Village is owned by the
20 County and Federal Government, and in the other
21 places that you mentioned, it's owned by the Town
22 and private property owners.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So that's the bottom
25 line. What we would be doing is going to the

1 State, County and Federal Government and
2 basically asking them to put a fence on their own
3 beach, or to allow us to put a fence on the
4 beach.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, the State.

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: But, I mean, that's -- I
7 know -- I know I'm confusing logic with
8 government, but they just spent \$21 million to
9 put the sand there. This is their sand, they
10 fund it. We're just telling them how to protect it.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, that makes a lot of
12 sense.

13 (Laughter)

14 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I'm sorry.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We never had a call
16 back from the Army Corps, right?

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, no. The only people
18 that pushed back, as Joe said, because the State
19 owns the beach, the only -- the only person we've
20 ever had pushback from was David Stilwell at the
21 Fish and Wildlife, who is a bad guy, doesn't like
22 us very much, takes every opportunity he can to
23 put the screws to us. So I think he's been muted
24 a little bit. With the Trump Administration, we
25 may have a shot.

1 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: If the Village was to
2 put out a how-to flier --

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We could do that.

4 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- for the residents,
5 and particularly lay the steps out of how to
6 implement your own fencing --

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

8 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- is there any
9 culpability in that for us, Joe, is that an
10 issue?

11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, yeah, you'd have to
12 tell them to get permission from the -- from
13 the --

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

15 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Oh, okay. Well, just a
16 thought.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think anybody that
18 really wanted to do it could just YouTube it and
19 they'll have all the information they need.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And suggest where they
21 can YouTube.

22 TRUSTEE EFF: Gary.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, John.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: You're -- you put out a great
25 letter from the Mayor to everybody. I imagine

1 it's a form letter that's used by a lot --

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, that could be the --

3 TRUSTEE EFF: All right. Could I -- at
4 least the last time I looked at the website, we
5 don't have anything up about Coronavirus on the
6 website. Do you think something like that should
7 be on the -- on the website? I mean, I don't
8 know.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What are going to put
10 on? What are you going to say?

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, just to maintain a
12 social distancing as a -- as an effective --

13 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, I think we should do
14 something.

15 The other thing is, as you know, I
16 attempted to use the restroom on Sunday and that
17 was a series of -- which is fine. But I realized
18 one thing. When I was leaving the area, I was
19 thinking about it and I looked at a file photo of
20 the Constabulary, and actually, that -- you know,
21 that is not handicapped accessible. I don't have
22 a problem with that.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's right.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: But what I think we should
25 do, I'll throw out a suggestion, is we need some

1 kind of a sign at the base of the stairway,
2 before you go into that contortion to go up
3 straight, and then right, and then -- you know,
4 for the residents or anybody that wants to come
5 there, before they climb all those stairs, and
6 something almost like at the beginning of the
7 Village. I'll call it the Mike Craig sign at the
8 beginning of the Village, although we don't have
9 anything in there. I think we need to do
10 something at the Constabulary, because, again,
11 that is not easily accessible to get up there to
12 read anything up there. So it might not be a bad
13 idea to do that, regardless of what we're going
14 to do in the future.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So a cautionary sign.

16 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, we need something
17 there.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, Angela and I have
19 been looking for -- we've located a couple of
20 places where we can buy those new sign boxes.

21 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, that's exactly the
22 point. You know, you only realize that once
23 you're up or down there riding home, and I'm
24 thinking, wow, that wouldn't be easy for somebody
25 that's just walking with crutches to get up

1 there.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. We'll give them a
3 rope.

4 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Well, I think -- I
6 think you have to be careful when you do that
7 stuff. I deal a lot with ADA --

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- and you have to do
10 it exactly as ADA says. I do believe that that
11 building, most likely, or at least -- let me say
12 this. At least from the time it became a
13 Constabulary. What year was that?

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Nineties, late '90s, '98,
15 '99.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It could have --
17 probably, there's a good chance that it predates
18 a lot of the ADA laws.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. Yeah, but they --

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I've run into that too
21 often in the cities -- in the City, and then we
22 find out that we don't, we don't have to comply.
23 But when you have -- when you comply with that,
24 you're going to have to get engineering drawings
25 done, architectural drawings done, and you can't

1 just do it any way you want.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, I think --

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There's grades that
4 have to be maintained, and you're talking about a
5 lot -- you know, some serious work.

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Guys, the new building, the
7 656 is going to be fully ADA compliant --

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yes, yes.

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- when that gets done.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yes.

11 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- by the end of the year,
12 so we're going to be good.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. I think what
15 John --

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I wouldn't waste any
17 money on that building.

18 TRUSTEE EFF: I'm just talking -- guys, I'm
19 just talking about a sign.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

21 TRUSTEE EFF: I'm not talking about
22 changing stairways --

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: -- or anything.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: But what is the sign
2 going to say?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Don't come up, because
4 the building is --

5 (Laughter)

6 TRUSTEE EFF: Well, what it -- what it
7 should do, it should have the notices in there,
8 so that anybody who is ADA compromised --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

10 TRUSTEE EFF: -- would be able to read it.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We can get a --

12 TRUSTEE EFF: I mean, you should be to
13 read it.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. Yeah, we should
15 get a sign put up.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay.

17 TRUSTEE EFF: That's good.

18 TRUSTEE CRAIG: One last thing from me
19 before I go. I just want to say I think this
20 call was good. We actually solved the mystery.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, what?

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Where all the toilet
23 paper --

24 (Laughter)

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- and paper towels have

1 gone. If you all look over Barry's shoulder.
2 Joe?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: There he is.

4 (Laughter)

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Hey, Barry. Hey,
6 Barry, I'll take picture of that and send it to
7 the NRA.

8 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: And I'm on eBay and I
9 sell it by the sheet.

10 (Laughter)

11 TRUSTEE CRAIG: You just said that and
12 we're have this whole thing recorded.

13 (Laughter)

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'm good.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right, guys, I think
16 we're pretty good.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yep.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Our next meeting will be
19 April 13th, which is, as Barry told us, Easter
20 Monday. That will be our budget hearing. So if
21 there's any changes you'd like to make, please,
22 get them out to me, but, please, CC everybody on
23 the email, so we all see the changes.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: Angela, how many people can
25 be accommodated on the public meeting on this?

1 CLERK SADELI: It's like -- with this, it's
2 like over 100.

3 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

5 TRUSTEE EFF: All right.

6 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: So do you want this
7 to be what -- the changes that you have
8 suggested, do you want this to be the tentative
9 budget right now? Because Angela is going to
10 have to publish the tentative budget.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: With the changes we made.

12 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Why not? Make the
14 changes.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay, okay.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There's only a couple.

17 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: They're significant.

18 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Gary, just as a quick
19 side, technical, as we do our next Village
20 meeting, we'll probably have another 20 some-odd
21 people on the video and on the call. Should we
22 suggest to them that they sign in 15 minutes
23 prior or a half hour prior to the meeting, so we
24 don't wait for them to catch up and delay us
25 going into our session?

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Why would we? Why
2 would we do that, because we don't let them delay
3 our meeting when we start our meeting any time.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. Well, so get on
5 in time, but get to work.

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, we start the
7 meeting when we want.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, the meeting will
9 start --

10 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Angela, why don't you just,
11 when you send it out, in big bold print, "Please,
12 mute your phone upon entry."

13 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, absolutely.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

15 TRUSTEE CRAIG: That's important.

16 TRUSTEE EFF: Now, when we do -- when we
17 end up having, Angela and/or Barry, when we do
18 have -- now let's say we have 25 people, that
19 would be like ironic. I mean --

20 CLERK SADELI: That would be a lot.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

22 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: That's what we had last
23 time.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: So I believe how it will be
25 displayed on our screens, each picture will be

1 much smaller than that.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

3 TRUSTEE EFF: In order to go around the
4 perimeter, I don't really know.

5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, they add, they add
6 pages to it, so there's -- I think that the
7 maximum is nine or twelve to a screen, and then
8 you would have to scroll down. And every time
9 you scroll down to a new page, you'd see another
10 twelve people or nine, nine people.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Or --

12 CLERK SADELI: I'll look into it, too. I
13 think I can pin, I can like pin the -- someone to
14 be like a representative. So I could pin Gary to
15 be the representative, so they can only see --

16 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah. You can only
17 have our, you know, our Counsel --

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

19 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: He'll just dial in and
20 we don't have to worry about their video.

21 CLERK SADELI: Right.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Angela, one more
23 suggestion. This works pretty well when we have
24 big groups, when there's like a Town Hall
25 meeting. I would encourage people to email their

1 questions prior to the meeting.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

3 CLERK SADELI: Sure.

4 TRUSTEE CRAIG: And you could go through
5 those questions one at a time. When we get done
6 with everything, Gary, you can take them one at a
7 time, you know --

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right, right.

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- and go through them,
10 because it's typically the same 15, 10, 15
11 people --

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

13 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- that come to meetings.
14 They typically have an agenda, and if we get
15 those questions out early, I think it will
16 just --

17 CLERK SADELI: Right.

18 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- provide a more orderly,
19 you know --

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I think that's a
21 good idea, Mike, that's a good idea.

22 CLERK SADELI: Could I ask them to email
23 them in prior?

24 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Prior. So it's going to be
25 important, Angela, to send emails out prior to

1 the meeting --

2 CLERK SADELI: Yeah.

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- at least a week, and
4 then a remainder. And then, you know, again, big
5 bold letters, "Please email any questions you
6 have for the Village Board prior to the meeting."

7 CLERK SADELI: Okay.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think what we'll do, I
9 think what we'll do is we'll send out an email to
10 everyone telling them, look, your taxable rate is
11 only changed by .08 points, you know eight
12 one-hundredths of a percent is your budgetary
13 increase, is your tax increase. And if you have
14 any questions prior, please give them to us now,
15 we'll read them off at the beginning. And, of
16 course, if you have any questions during the
17 meeting, there'll be period of time we can answer
18 them.

19 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

20 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: And, also, Joe, do we
21 have to put in a public notice that it would be
22 held by video?

23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

25 CLERK SADELI: I already did, I published it.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: She already published it.

2 TRUSTEE EFF: My final question. Is there
3 anything still that the annexation has life?

4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, right now, there's
5 no --

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: The what?

7 TRUSTEE EFF: Annexation.

8 ATTORNEY PROKOP: For the last
9 month-and-a-half, there haven't -- I mean, for
10 the last month, we haven't been able to have a
11 meeting. So it has life as far as it's been --

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's spectral.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It don't look so good.

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's on life support
15 until we could start meetings again, then we'll
16 start it up again.

17 TRUSTEE EFF: All right. Okay.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You know, we can't go
19 door-to-door, that's the problem right now.

20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll need to do as much
22 as we can that way.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, well, we don't --
24 we don't have much good news to bring.

25 (Laughter)

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, we do, Gary. We
2 have a zero --

3 CLERK SADELI: Yes, we do, we got a new
4 beach, and our tax rate didn't go up that much.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: What else you got?

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You have a zero crime
8 rate. People live here. There's not a crime to
9 be had in our Village, which is wonderful. I'm
10 not, you know, taking a risk by saying it, but,
11 also, you have a responsive government.

12 These people have come out. I got -- oh, I
13 got an email. I'll send you all a copy of the
14 latest news, what our town has been up to.

15 The East End Mayors and Supervisors meeting
16 was held -- where the heck is it? I just had it.
17 The East End Mayors, the East End Mayors and
18 Supervisors joint statement to Governor Cuomo
19 right here, where the East End Mayors and
20 Supervisors wanted me to sign a document telling
21 them -- telling the Governor we have to keep the
22 City people out from coming here, because they're
23 emptying the shelves of our stores and taxing our
24 essential services more than they're worth,
25 basically.

1 And, of course, there are six or seven new
2 villages on Long Island and there are five towns,
3 and the towns that signed it were, first,
4 Southampton, Jay Schneiderman, second, Supervisor
5 of Southold, Russell -- Scott Russell, and
6 Yvette Aguiar, the Supervisor of the Town of
7 Riverhead, signed the document. And of the seven
8 villages, unfortunately, and I can't believe
9 this, Mayor Moore of Westhampton Beach signed it,
10 Mayor Sander of North Haven signed it, and Mayor
11 Donald Louchheim of Sagaponack signed it, also
12 the Village of Greenport. And then the
13 Shinnecock Nation, signed it, three of their
14 Chair People.

15 But the audacity of this document is that
16 the quote-unquote summer people are not wanted at
17 this time, they should be kept in New York, in
18 Manhattan. I, of course, adamantly opposed it,
19 and demanded that my -- that our name is not
20 connected to that document at all. I took
21 offense to it being sent by the East End Mayors,
22 but I think they've taken it off.

23 And so it's just going to -- from the -- a
24 joint statement to Governor Cuomo from the East
25 End Supervisors and Village Mayors and leaders of

1 the Shinnecock Nation regarding nonessential
2 traffic from New York metropolitan area to the
3 East End.

4 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Well, then we should be
5 able to deduct our taxes from the time we're not
6 allowed to use our summer homes.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What I said to them was,
8 if you're willing to collect only three months
9 worth of taxes, you can call them summer people,
10 but they're not summer residents if you're
11 charging them all year long. And while your kids
12 are going to the school for \$3,000 a year, next
13 year it will be \$25,000 when you deduct the
14 summer people from it. Obviously, you know --

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It's ridiculous what
16 they were saying, it was ridiculous.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Absolutely, but, in
18 effect, it had quite a few Mayors, because I made
19 the statement as soon as the document came out
20 last Monday. And Angela will tell you, by the
21 time I got it and made the statement, three or
22 four other Mayors who signed on in favor of it,
23 very few of them signed the document. So we've
24 had an effect on it, but the fact is it still
25 remains our summer people are not well liked by

1 the real residents.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: They're residents.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Of course they are.

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You can't stop somebody
5 from going to their home.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes. That kind of
7 discriminatory behavior --

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Really.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- shouldn't even be
10 spoken, but, you know --

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It's crazy.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. Well, we're moving
13 on. We got our budget, I think we're in great
14 shape. And God bless, hopefully, everybody stays
15 healthy.

16 TRUSTEE EFF: Do we think that Cupsogue
17 will be closed, you know --

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And it's been very
19 heavily trafficked this last week.

20 TRUSTEE EFF: I know, I know that.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't believe it will
22 ever be formally closed. There may -- it depends
23 on when the social distancing, you know, laws get
24 lifted, but I think it will be opened rapidly
25 after that.

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'll tell you, I was --
2 I was there last week on a nice day --

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- and there had to be
5 over 100 people down there.

6 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah, I was out for the
7 week and there were a lot of people on the beach.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: There's a lot of people.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: The beach and in the
10 parking lot.

11 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right now, we have about
13 90 -- about over 100 homes fully occupied in the
14 Village right now. But Cupsogue and Pike's --
15 Cupsogue not so much -- Pike's not so much, but
16 Cupsogue has been heavily used.

17 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah, I noticed that.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We had a day -- on the
19 issue, we had to call the State -- we had to call
20 the County Rangers in, but that's about it.

21 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Yeah, that's part of my
22 concern, was so the constables are making sure
23 they have the right equipment when they call
24 people over and that, you know --

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yep.

1 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: -- that they're safe.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, they're good right now.

3 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: Okay.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right?

5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I was behind -- I was
6 behind Barry at the store when he was buying that
7 stuff, and I got a picture of his shopping cart.
8 I just wanted to show you.

9 (Laughter)

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Is that your shopping
11 cart, Barry?

12 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I saw Barry buying it.

13 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: That could have
14 been me.

15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: That's Barry's shopping
16 cart right there.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's what they're
18 talking about, Barry, all the summer people
19 taking up their resources like toilet paper.

20 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, you summer person.

21 (Laughter)

22 TRUSTEE GOLDFEDER: That's because I live
23 with a bunch of slob.

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Hey, Barry, I got a
25 short video I'm going to send you, you're going

1 to get a kick out of it.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Listen, if the next viral
3 threat is one of diarrhea, does that mean
4 there'll be a run on nasal spray?

5 MS. BRAATEN: Should I stop? Should I keep
6 going?

7 (Laughter)

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Are we still on the
9 record?

10 MS. BRAATEN: Yes.

11 CLERK SADELI: Of course.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh. I move to adjourn.

13 (Laughter)

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right, we're done,
15 we're done.

16 MS. BRAATEN: I guess I'll take that out.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think we're done.

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

19 (Laughter)

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We're feeling pretty
21 good, off the cuff. All right, guys.

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Good night, everybody.
23 Have a good one.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

25 (The meeting was adjourned at 5:34 p.m.)
