1 (The Meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m.)

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay, everybody. Of course,  
3 unfortunately, we're going to skip the Pledge of  
4 Allegiance.

5 I've got to get a flag somewhere we can do the  
6 pledge.

7 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Yeah, really.

8 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I know.

9 TRUSTEE EFF: Angela, maybe we can share a flag  
10 on the screen at some point?

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, well, figure it out.  
12 We'll get it in the background. But we'll see. Looks  
13 like I have a cross behind my head.

14 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I have one right here.

15 CLERK SADELI: There you go, Mike.

16 TRUSTEE GESSIN: There you go.

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: One thing's for St. Patrick's,  
18 so it's gonna be --

19 (Discussion overlapping)

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's right, tomorrow's St.  
21 Patrick's Day.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: So, Gary, go ahead.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Pledge it?

24 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah, why not?

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

1 (The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all.)

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. That was very nice.

3 CLERK SADELI: Well, we got more. We've got a  
4 lot of people on tonight.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, good, we got a lot, two  
6 meetings.

7 CLERK SADELI: Everyone's joining.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. Let's get  
9 everybody muted before we start. You can hear  
10 everybody.

11 CLERK SADELI: You just have to let them join  
12 first. It's when they're joining.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I know. Okay.

14 CLERK SADELI: Dr. Mueller, could you mute  
15 yourself -- I can't --

16 DR. MULLER: I'm doing it right now. Excuse me.

17 CLERK SADELI: Thank you. I don't know who that  
18 is.

19 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Kick them out. Everybody that's  
20 not muted will be kicked out, that simple.

21 CLERK SADELI: All right. I got everybody now.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. All right. So we  
23 have real pressing issues, we have movie night. That's  
24 the first thing on the agenda. Angela, what's the scoop  
25 on movie night?

1           CLERK SADELI: Well, we always pick the date in  
2 March that way we can start planning it. I'm just going  
3 to mute you guys, Dr. Brenner.

4           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: There you go.

5           CLERK SADELI: There's more people --

6           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

7           CLERK SADELI: -- in the waiting room, and Joe's  
8 one of them.

9           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, let Joe in.

10          CLERK SADELI: Okay. So, you know, we just like  
11 to pick the night so we can start planning it so I can  
12 book the screen and stuff, so I was thinking  
13 August 14th.

14          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's late in the season, I  
15 would do it a little earlier if you can.

16          CLERK SADELI: We always do it the second week.

17          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I know, but I would do it a  
18 little earlier --

19          CLERK SADELI: I can't do it the 7th because  
20 it's my son's birthday.

21          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What's that?

22          CLERK SADELI: I can't do it the 7th because  
23 that's my son's birthday.

24          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's one day we can't do it.

25          CLERK SADELI: Okay. And we always wait 'til

1 August 'cause it gets dark, right, Mike?

2 TRUSTEE CRAIG: No, it's, um -- listen, the 31st  
3 is one day outside of August, so --

4 CLERK SADELI: Okay.

5 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- if you want to go July 31.

6 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: That might be nice.

7 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, that a good idea.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Let's do it July 1st, no --

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: No, 31st.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- July 31st.

11 TRUSTEE CRAIG: July 31st, it's a Saturday  
12 night.

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, try that.

14 CLERK SADELI: Okay.

15 TRUSTEE EFF: Last year we ran into a problem  
16 because of the weather and we got --

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Right.

18 CLERK SADELI: So it's better to plan it earlier  
19 then if we have to make it a rain day, we can, you  
20 know --

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Let's plan it for the 31st and  
22 if we have to change it, that'll be you.

23 CLERK SADELI: All right, sounds good.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Good. All right.

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Angela, let your son pick the

1 movie this year again.

2 CLERK SADELI: Okay. I will. He picked it last  
3 year, too.

4 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I know, I know, my kids used to,  
5 so let him.

6 CLERK SADELI: Aww, thank you.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: If anybody has any suggestions  
8 for a movie, please give them to us --

9 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, you can always email me.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll consider it also.

11 TRUSTEE GESSIN: How about Top Gun?

12 CLERK SADELI: That's perfect.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, Gary's calling. Hold on.

14 CLERK SADELI: In Westhampton Beach they do  
15 their own movie night every Saturday or every Monday.

16 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Oh, really? I didn't know  
17 that.

18 CLERK SADELI: Right on the great lawn and they  
19 do some pretty good movies.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Angela?

21 CLERK SADELI: Yes.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Gary lost his Internet, so if  
23 he calls in --

24 CLERK SADELI: He can call in.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What's the phone number he

1 should call in?

2 CLERK SADELI: It's the first phone number. I  
3 don't have it on --

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Hold on. Let's see if we get  
5 it up here. I'll give you the number, Gary, call right  
6 into the meeting.

7 CLERK SADELI: Hold on. I got more people  
8 joining.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

10 CLERK SADELI: Lot's of people on tonight.

11 TRUSTEE EFF: I don't even -- I don't even think  
12 we're talking the dog law.

13 (Laughter)

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I just walk my dog.

15 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Hey, Gary, you want me to give  
16 you the number?

17 DR. BRENNER: We're not participating in this at  
18 all.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I can hear you, Dr. Brenner.

20 DR. BRENNER: Okay. Can you hear me?

21 CLERK SADELI: I keep hearing you.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: She's going to get you the  
23 number, Gary.

24 MR. HILL: Hey, Gary, hey, Gary.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

1 MR. HILL: This is Daily, do you know they're  
2 fire trucks by the village, right?

3 CLERK SADELI: Oh, no.

4 MRS. HILL: There's three fire trucks right by  
5 our little building there at the entrance to the  
6 neighborhood.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, my God, that can answer a  
8 lot of questions.

9 MRS. HILL: Honestly, Gary, it looks like -- it  
10 looks like our building was on fire.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Tim, Tim Mc Guire, are you on?  
12 Brian, I see you.

13 MR. MCGUIRE: Yes, I'm calling Jake right -- I'm  
14 calling right now.

15 MRS. HILL: Someone's sitting in a parking lot.  
16 One of the cops is sitting in the parking lot.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I know, I got Tim on the  
18 line. I got Tim on the line.

19 MRS. HILL: Okay.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Brian?

21 SERGEANT HENNIG: Yeah, I'm calling Jake right  
22 now, Gary, I'll let you know shortly.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Let him know he should be  
24 calling us, by the way, you know that.

25 MRS. HILL: I don't think the cops knew.



1           SERGEANT TURNER: I'm sure he does, but give him  
2 a few minutes to get himself figured out before he gives  
3 anyone a call. Jake's very good, I'm sure he's --

4           (Discussion overlapping)

5           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I know. All right. Tim,  
6 you're good. Gary, you got it? All right, I think Gary  
7 has the number.

8           Yeah, no, I know, Jake is a long term, highly  
9 qualified --

10          (Discussion overlapping)

11          TRUSTEE CRAIG: We still have -- we still have  
12 conversations in the background from folks who are not  
13 muted.

14          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think we have Dr. Brenner.

15          CLERK SADELI: Dr. Brenner.

16          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

17          CLERK SADELI: Can you mute yourself?

18          TRUSTEE CRAIG: No, please mute, please mute  
19 your phone so we don't hear any background so we can --

20          DR. BRENNER: It's not us.

21          CLERK SADELI: The only person not muted is  
22 Irwin, do you think you can mute yourself? I can't mute  
23 you for some reason.

24          MR. KRASNOW: Oh, no?

25          SERGEANT HENNIG: Gary, it's Brian. Gary, can

1 you hear me?

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

3 SERGEANT HENNIG: There's a very good reason  
4 Jake didn't say anything, because it's the fire  
5 department practicing on the house as they were supposed  
6 to.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They're supposed to tell us  
8 when they have practice.

9 TRUSTEE GESSIN: What are they breaking it up?

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, they just -- they  
11 practice, they put one or two holes, but no big deal.

12 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Oh, good.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: But they were supposed to have  
14 done it weeks ago.

15 All right. Well, all right. So movie night,  
16 done.

17 Rental law. Please remember, everybody, we want  
18 you to understand that if you're going to rent your  
19 house, you need to apply for a rental permit prior to  
20 listing the house for rental, because you have to  
21 publish your rental permit number on any electronic  
22 media, so if you do not have a rental permit in place,  
23 you will be fined if you rent without the permit. I  
24 just want to be very clear, is that accurate, Angela?

25 CLERK SADELI: That's right. I had someone call

1 today saying that they had their, you know, leases and  
2 they were going to send them over and she had it on  
3 VRBO. I said you really need to call and get the rental  
4 permit number first, if we saw that you were renting it  
5 out I would have had to, you know...

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

7 TRUSTEE GESSIN: But, Gary, they're just  
8 registering to rent --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

10 TRUSTEE GESSIN: -- they're not renting.

11 CLERK SADELI: They're registering for the first  
12 number, and then the \$150 goes towards the first rental  
13 permit. And her question was what if I don't rent it,  
14 which I knew she -- she rents every year, but I told her  
15 that we would apply it to the following year or if she  
16 decided not to rent again that she could get a refund.

17 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Okay.

18 TRUSTEE CRAIG: That's fair.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, we want to be as fair as  
20 we can about this.

21 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yup.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's just an effort to keep  
23 things legitimate and that we have track of what's going  
24 on.

25 Okay. That's the rental law.

1 Third, bids received for the contract on 3/12.

2 All right, we'll go back to that when we do 656.

3 Piping Plover meeting. The Fish & Wildlife, New  
4 York State Fish & Wildlife with the DEC. The DEC will  
5 be out in the Village on March, what, 27th?

6 CLERK SADELI: 22nd.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: 22nd, to do the -- erect the  
8 preliminary fencing. If anybody has a medical condition  
9 that requires them or provides them a difficulty getting  
10 to the beach, please send us a copy of the medical  
11 notice and a request and we will put into the DEC and  
12 Fish & Wildlife your request. They've been fairly  
13 responsive in the past, but it all depends on where the  
14 birds were last year as to whether or not they can  
15 modify the fence. So if you have a special need, you  
16 have an elderly family member that has trouble getting  
17 to the beach, let us know, and give us the information,  
18 we'll get it over to the Fish & Wildlife.

19 TRUSTEE EFF: Do they -- Gary, do they give us  
20 an outline or a map of where they're gonna put this  
21 fencing?

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They go -- no. What they do,  
23 John, is they go with the maps of the previous years,  
24 several years, previous bird population and then they  
25 formulate where they're gonna put the fencing. They

1 really don't give us a map because they don't want to be  
2 held to it if they change the fencing. You know, they  
3 kinda shoot from the seat of their pants, so they really  
4 don't want to give any -- any validity to a complaint,  
5 although they have been fairly responsive and year after  
6 year they're getting more and more responsive to our  
7 requests. So if you have a need, let us know, and  
8 we'll -- we'll be your advocate. All right.

9 We had to develop a COVID-19 Pandemic Plan,  
10 which Angela worked very hard on.

11 CLERK SADELI: And Joe.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And Joe, that's right. Yeah,  
13 Joe's been very busy, Joe and Angela both, and Bob,  
14 they've been very busy the last couple of months.

15 Yeah, we're gonna have to vote on approving it  
16 tonight, guys. It's basically -- basically a plan, we  
17 got -- we got a blank plan from NYCOM that meets the  
18 requirements and one that we believe we can meet, we  
19 went over it, tuned it up a little bit, and I think it's  
20 tonight we should pass it, but that will be --

21 CLERK SADELI: We have to pass it by April 1st,  
22 so we've got to do it tonight.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

24 CLERK SADELI: But it basically just outlines,  
25 you know, what would happen if there was another

1 pandemic.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

3 CLERK SADELI: If we had to close the office,  
4 who would work, who, you know, we delegate tasks to how  
5 to clean, how to, you know, maintain, you know,  
6 precautions in the Village.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Also tonight will be --  
8 there'll be a bond for the 656A Dune Road. The VID-Bond  
9 for the 656, it's not in the bid.

10 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, the bid is separate.

11 CLERK SADELI: I must have put it on the same  
12 line.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. So we are with --  
14 are we voting for a bond?

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: VID-Bond.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Are we voting for a bond on  
17 656 tonight?

18 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I don't believe we are.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't believe we are, right?

20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, we don't -- we don't  
21 have the paperwork, we're going to have it for the March  
22 31st meeting.

23 CLERK SADELI: Oh, okay.

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I spoke to bond counsel and he  
25 wants to speak to the Mayor and the Treasurer about --

1 and Charlene and Angela about some of the options that  
2 we have.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So he didn't -- he didn't feel  
5 comfortable doing for it tonight, he needs to speak to  
6 you --

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

8 ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- about the different  
9 options.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. And, well --  
11 that's all -- we'll discuss that in depth on the 31st,  
12 right?

13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We'll circulate it to the  
16 Board ahead of time.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. If anybody else  
18 wants that information, when we get it, we'll circulate  
19 it around to anyone who wants it.

20 Basically what we're doing is getting prepared  
21 for the -- for the bond that the Village will need on  
22 656A Dune Road, my new constabulary. We're very excited  
23 about it. Our Constables are very excited about it. I  
24 think it will add a level of professionalism to the  
25 community.

1 MS. FINE: I would love to share with --

2 CLERK SADELI: Hold on. I'm going to mute her.  
3 Oh, she muted herself.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I would love --  
5 everybody -- we believe a level of professionalism to  
6 the Village and it will be a very good -- I think it's a  
7 very big issue. Let's see.

8 CLERK SADELI: Oh, wait. Where did they go?

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What?

10 CLERK SADELI: I lost the screen for a second,  
11 sorry.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. Now, on 656, do we  
13 have bids that we received from the contractors? Last  
14 month we approved the bid on the 656 building. As some  
15 of you know -- can I have some water? Give me some  
16 water, please -- as some of you know, we're buying a  
17 prefab house basically, a manufactured home. And we'll  
18 be making that our constabulary. It will be placed at  
19 656, I have all of -- I'm sorry, it'll have everything  
20 our Constables need to really make a great -- to  
21 increase the level of protection in the Village, not  
22 that we've had any crime, because as you all know, we're  
23 the safest Village in America to date, and we intend to  
24 keep it that way. But we will be adding some electronic  
25 features to this building that will help monitor the



1 traffic and the vehicles coming in. So we're very  
2 excited about it. And we received some bids for the  
3 extra services that we'll need contracted for the  
4 Village. We're going to bid, we're going to -- I  
5 believe we're going to award the bid for the piling  
6 foundation, and I think that's all we're going to award  
7 tonight, right?

8 TRUSTEE GESSIN: No, the demolition.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And the demolition, right?

10 All right. On piling foundation, when the bids  
11 were compared, we believe the most qualified bidder was  
12 Brandt Construction; is that right, Harvey?

13 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Brandt Marine.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Brandt Marine. At 27,000.

15 TRUSTEE GESSIN: 27,843.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's correct. The one bid  
17 that appeared to be less, but when we had compared what  
18 the bid was delivering and what was being bid Brandt  
19 was -- was not only clearly the winner in dollar value,  
20 but in qualifications. I'm sorry.

21 The second bid we are gonna award, I believe,  
22 will be to South Shore Docks for the demolition; is that  
23 correct, Harvey?

24 TRUSTEE GESSIN: I don't know. You know, we've  
25 had a tie, we had two bidders at 12-5.

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. Right.

2           TRUSTEE GESSIN: Right? I -- from what I  
3 understood, we had to -- which I got through the  
4 grapevine, I think it was Joe's comment, that we had to  
5 interview both bidders and make sure that they're both  
6 qualified to do the job.

7           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right, Joe?

8           ATTORNEY PROKOP: Right. So I would do what's  
9 called qualifying the bidders.

10          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

11          ATTORNEY PROKOP: Which is calling them and  
12 interviewing them.

13          TRUSTEE GESSIN: Oh.

14          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Then we'll qualify  
15 them.

16          TRUSTEE GESSIN: So, yeah, it was South Shore  
17 Docks and Los Dos Ases --

18          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

19          TRUSTEE GESSIN -- were the same price.

20          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The 12-5.

21          TRUSTEE GESSIN: Yeah.

22          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I believe there was -- I think  
23 there was something different -- well, we'll see, we'll  
24 interview them and we'll see.

25          TRUSTEE GESSIN: I don't know, I can't tell from

1 their bids.

2           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And on the electric bid,  
3 unfortunately we have to rebid that because Harvey  
4 brought up a very good point, that we should increase  
5 the service brought in especially now with the advent of  
6 what we believe new technology regarding vehicles, we  
7 believe it will only be a matter of time before many of  
8 our patrol vehicles, and some of our residents, may have  
9 a need for a charging station, and if that's true, we  
10 need to have the service increased. So we're gonna  
11 rebid the electric bid.

12           TRUSTEE EFF: Have we ever -- Gary, let me ask  
13 you a question, have we ever actually -- well, let me  
14 re -- let me step back. This modular house comes  
15 prewired, correct?

16           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's correct, yes.

17           TRUSTEE EFF: All right. So have we -- have we  
18 made any modifications to the wiring in that based on  
19 needs --

20           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No.

21           TRUSTEE EFF: -- of the Constables?

22           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It needs to be -- when they  
23 develop -- when we designed the bid for the house, the  
24 Constables and Bob have gone over all of their  
25 requirements interior as to what they need, and so

1 it's -- it was bid for their needs.

2 TRUSTEE EFF: All right. Did we ever -- did we  
3 ever consider having the backup generator on that  
4 building?

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, we don't have it as --  
6 we have it bid, but we are considering putting one in.

7 TRUSTEE EFF: I think we should.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We will.

9 TRUSTEE EFF: I think that that's --

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Definitely. But we felt that  
11 would be a service brought to us after the building is  
12 constructed.

13 TRUSTEE EFF: And are we -- are we considering  
14 also the charging stations as an after, something  
15 brought in after that we're gonna design into the --

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, that's why we were  
17 increasing the ampage.

18 TRUSTEE EFF: How many -- how many -- I don't  
19 want to get into the minutia of this.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, two.

21 TRUSTEE EFF: But how many charging --

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Two.

23 TRUSTEE EFF: How many charging stations are we  
24 looking at?

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Two. We figure --

1 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We figure there'll be two.

3 TRUSTEE EFF: Okay.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You know, with the new  
5 technology out there and more and more, you know,  
6 there's going to be more electrification out there.

7 TRUSTEE EFF: Yes, no, absolutely, it's a good  
8 point.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Plus --

10 TRUSTEE GESSIN: It's only a matter of time.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- as John knows, and he's  
12 been helpful in this, we're hopeful of getting -- and  
13 the reason we didn't get a generator or the actual  
14 charging stations in the plans is because we believe  
15 there may be some grant money available to us. But we  
16 brought the service into the -- into the building --

17 TRUSTEE EFF: Right.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- so that we can accommodate  
19 it, so what we'll have is enough service to accommodate  
20 charging stations and then with the opportunity of being  
21 able to build a charging station, we may be able to  
22 apply for grants. And John is very active in that  
23 field, you know.

24 CLERK SADELI: Sorry. I have a resident who has  
25 their hand up. Are we going to take their question now,

1 if it has to pertain to this or do you want to take it  
2 at the end?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Who's -- what question does he  
4 have? Let him in. Let him in. Let him in.

5 CLERK SADELI: Go ahead. Just state your name.

6 MR. LECHNER: Hey, Gary, Gary, it's Mitch  
7 Lechner, how are you?

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Hi, Mitch, how are you?  
9 What's up?

10 MR. LECHNER: Great. I just want to know, do  
11 you have a rendering you can share with us of the, uh,  
12 of the new building?

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, we have a rendering, we  
14 can probably send it on email, can't we, Ang?

15 CLERK SADELI: Sure.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We can get you a copy. It's  
17 very simple building. It's about 32X30, basically it's  
18 a square building with a pitched roof, one story. It's,  
19 you know, it's a very basic building.

20 MR. LECHNER: All right. Thank you.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll send you a rendering, no  
22 problem.

23 MR. LECHNER: All right, that would be great.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It won't be 'til Friday  
25 though, how's that?

1 MR. LECHNER: No problem, thank you.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. We'll email you.  
3 Okay.

4 All right. Let's go. 656 Dune Road, and the  
5 bond, all right. That pretty much wraps up, right? All  
6 right.

7 Trustees, you guys got anything you want to talk  
8 about?

9 TRUSTEE EFF: I just wanted to ask one other  
10 question about the two bids, the two bids that are the  
11 same bid level, and after they get qualified, if they  
12 pass the muster and they're still the same, how do we  
13 decide amongst the two?

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'd have to go -- we go with  
15 what is considered the most qualified, what we'll  
16 probably do --

17 TRUSTEE EFF: Right.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- is ask for a list of  
19 clients and interview the clients and then we just --  
20 we -- we make the call.

21 TRUSTEE EFF: All right. Okay.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. It's the lowest  
23 qualified bidder.

24 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Gary, did we talk about the  
25 bonds for the Village Improvement District for the 12

1 homes?

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh.

3 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: The VID.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The VID, yeah.

5 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah, we talked about the bond  
6 for 656.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

8 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Did we talk about the bond  
9 for --

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yup. Basically we have -- we  
11 have estimates, we've been given estimates from Aran and  
12 First Coastal, and I believe the bid, it looks like it's  
13 gonna be somewhere around 455 --

14 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: 450 to 475 --

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's gonna be between 450 and  
16 \$500,000. And I think, of course, the VID has to look  
17 at that, but we've been provided much of the  
18 information, but basically it's a -- it's a very  
19 expensive project that is going to I think be very  
20 functional, it's somewhere around 450, Mike.

21 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Between the 12 homes, it would  
23 be split between the 12 homes and over the duration of  
24 between 10 and 15 years, we don't know yet until bond --  
25 bond counsel does an analysis as to how long it will be.



1 TRUSTEE GESSIN: And, Gary, what addresses does  
2 this include?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It goes from --

4 TRUSTEE CRAIG: It's roughly 674 to 698 I wanna  
5 say.

6 So, Gary, on that point, if we're gonna move  
7 forward with this, then that's got to be part of our  
8 budget discussion, it means that obviously we're --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Does not impact our budget.  
10 'Cause that money will be immediately billed to the  
11 homeowners.

12 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We will not need to know  
13 the amount?

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We need to know the amount,  
15 but it wouldn't impact us.

16 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah, right. So we don't need  
17 to -- we don't need to put an interest payment in there  
18 and have an in-out journal where we're paying it and  
19 then we're receiving it?

20 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Hi, Gary.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Hold on.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Oh, okay.

23 Angela, you have to let Gary Trimarchi in.

24 CLERK SADELI: There's nobody in the waiting  
25 room.

1           TREASURER VEGLIANTE:  There's nobody in the  
2 waiting room.

3           CLERK SADELI:  What's his phone number?

4           TREASURER VEGLIANTE:  Okay.  All right.  Wait.  
5 I'll give you his number.  He just hung up to call.

6           MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Oh.

7           TREASURER VEGLIANTE:  But wait a second.

8           MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Gary Trimarchi's phone.

9           TREASURER VEGLIANTE:  (917) 656.

10          CLERK SADELI:  No one's in the waiting room.

11          TREASURER VEGLIANTE:  Give him a couple minutes.  
12 He said nobody was letting him in.  He couldn't get in  
13 the meeting.

14          CLERK SADELI:  There's nobody there.  The only  
15 person who was in the waiting room just now is Jim  
16 Cashin, but he's in now.

17          MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Daily Hill, you're on, right?  
18 Daily's on, right?

19          CLERK SADELI:  Yes.

20          MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Right.  Okay.

21          TRUSTEE CRAIG:  So, Gary, I'm just -- I'm  
22 looking at Noah's email from Thursday, March 11th.

23          MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Right.

24          TRUSTEE CRAIG:  Which Claire was good enough to  
25 send around, and he said if we borrow an additional 150

1 and 450, he would make provisions for interest payments,  
2 and I assume that 150 was for the house, 656 --

3 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Right.

4 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- 450 was for the --

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: For the VID.

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: For the -- yeah, the Village  
7 Improvement District, so we do need to put that in?

8 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: You have to put it in the  
9 bond, but actually they're only paying interest for the  
10 first year.

11 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Right, so we should -- when we  
12 get to the budget we should probably think about that --

13 TRUSTEE VEGLIANTE: Right.

14 TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- no?

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, no, no, no, we  
16 have to -- we have to include that, but we have to know  
17 the amount that we're gonna do so that we've got a good  
18 idea.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Just add this on our bond, not  
20 on the VID.

21 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: On the VID-Bond, too, we  
22 don't pay it, but it's included in our -- our budget.

23 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Right, it's in our budget.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, yeah, it doesn't impact  
25 us.

1 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Right, it doesn't impact the tax  
2 rate, but it impacts what we pass tonight.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's good.

4 TRUSTEE CRAIG: So maybe a question for Joe, and  
5 we'll get into it when we get the budget, I just thought  
6 about that.

7 So is there anything for the Village Improvement  
8 District people that are listening, is there any message  
9 for them at this point, either Joe or I don't think Aran  
10 is on, but is there anything that they need to be doing  
11 at this point to move this bond forward?

12 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: They all have to realize  
13 they have to agree to -- to what is going to be bond.  
14 And they want, you know, for us to go forward, you know,  
15 they have to just get everything in gear.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Once you know what the bond is  
17 and what the payments will be, the VID district will  
18 have to send us notice.

19 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We'll have to ratify it, right?

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll have to ratify it and  
21 they'll send us letters that they want to go forward.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay.

23 MR. CUSICK: Hi, it's Phil, can you hear me?

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What's that?

25 MR. CUSICK: Hi, it's Phil, can you hear me?

1 Hey, it's Phil Cusick at 676.

2 CLERK SADELI: Oh, it's Phil Cusick.

3 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Do you want to call --

4 MR. CUSICK: Hey, how are you?

5 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, she doesn't see you,  
6 she doesn't see you at all.

7 MR. CUSICK: No, I'm on the phone, sorry.

8 I just want to let you know --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, no, not you.

10 MR. CUSICK: -- so, we all agreed in August, we  
11 all agreed in August that this was gonna go forward, so  
12 everybody's on board. Um, we should alert everybody to  
13 the price, but -- but, um, everybody's on board.

14 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Angela, it says that he's  
15 in the meeting, please wait.

16 CLERK SADELI: I do not see him.

17 MR. CUSICK: Can you hear me?

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We don't need to see him.  
19 He's on audio, just let's listen to what he's saying.

20 MR. CUSICK: Yeah, I'm not on video.

21 CLERK SADELI: That's not what I'm talking  
22 about. I'm talking about Gary Trimarchi, our Trustee,  
23 is having a hard time getting into the waiting room.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

25 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Do you see him, Angela?

1 CLERK SADELI: No.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, because I went out of  
3 it.

4 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Well, now we hear him.

5 (Treasurer Trimarchi is on via phone.)

6 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: But we didn't see you. Do  
7 you want to stay on here? And we can just keep it --

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, yeah, I'll just stay  
9 on here.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right, Gary's on --

11 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Gary's on speaker here.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Right. Once we discern  
13 what the actual -- what the VID-Bond will be, we'll  
14 notify the members of the VID, and they either approve  
15 it or not.

16 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah, we're gonna want that in  
17 writing, Joe?

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

19 TRUSTEE CRAIG: And then they'll -- Joe --

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: How do they ratify it, Joe?

21 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, since they're not a  
22 formal Board, I mean the only way to do it is to have an  
23 acknowledgment from each one of them really.

24 MR. CUSICK: Well, I think you guys have alerted  
25 us that we can just do majority, right? We don't need a

1 signoff of from everyone?

2 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: They need to signoff, they  
3 all have to pay.

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You need to signoff for  
5 everybody.

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Everybody's got to signoff in  
7 writing, and they need to extend their -- their easement  
8 agreements which have expired or will expire shortly.

9 ATTORNEY PROKOP: They're about to expire,  
10 right.

11 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay. So --

12 MR. CUSICK: Okay, then we'll need to -- to get  
13 it in writing and we'll sign it.

14 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yup. Okay. So we'll get --

15 MR. CUSICK: I'm sorry to -- I'm sorry to  
16 interrupt, but didn't we have a whole discussion in the  
17 summer of last year that this group was gonna be -- I  
18 can't remember the term that the town had used, but we  
19 were gonna be recognized as a group and that all we  
20 needed was a majority going forward?

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe?

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I don't remember that.

23 MR. CUSICK: Okay. All right.

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, the Board -- it's really  
25 up to the Board of Trustees to decide, but I think that

1 given the significance of the project, it's probably a  
2 good idea to have some kind of indication from the  
3 individual homeowners.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Phil, I don't think --

5 MR. CUSICK: Okay.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- I don't think there's going  
7 to be a problem.

8 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: But what I'm concerned about,  
10 and I think what Phil's a little concerned about, is  
11 what if there's one or two hold offs --

12 MR. CUSICK: Right. And we go back into the  
13 year's long --

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

15 MR. CUSICK: Dragging signatures out of people.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We're trying to avoid that. I  
17 think we have to explore what we do about that.

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: If everybody said they  
19 agreed --

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That doesn't mean anything.

21 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: They did not sign anything.

23 MR. CUSICK: Joe, when we formed -- when we  
24 formed the VID, Joe, I do remember that, um, they had  
25 all signed on for it.



1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I agree.

2           TRUSTEE CRAIG: It may have been a different  
3 project, but I don't think Phil is too far from the  
4 concept of how we formed this VID.

5           ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, you have the authority,  
6 the Board of Trustees has the authority to go ahead and  
7 spend the money and charge it to the homeowners in their  
8 taxes. It's up to you whether you want to do it that  
9 way or if you'd like to get some kind of written  
10 acknowledgment from each of the owners.

11          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

12          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Also we've been down this  
13 road before, right?

14          MR. CUSICK: I have no issue with signing,  
15 signing a piece of paper and I think 10 or 12 don't  
16 either, but, but --

17          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Look --

18          MR. CUSICK: -- dragging signatures out of  
19 everyone's never easy.

20          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, I know. Why don't we do  
21 this, why don't we get the numbers down, we'll present  
22 them to your Board, and you approve them, and if there's  
23 anyone whose adverse to it, they can make -- contact us,  
24 but I think we have the authority to bind them all,  
25 right, Joe? I think that's...

1           ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah, I mean my main concern  
2 is the time -- the time that's gone by since -- since  
3 Phil said that they got the approval and, you know, now  
4 we know definitively what the project's going to -- the  
5 scale of the project and what it's gonna cost, so I  
6 would just ask Phil to get the approval of the group  
7 again, you know, with the --

8           MR. CUSICK: Okay.

9           ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- now that they have all the  
10 details.

11           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I think that's a good  
12 idea. I think, Phil, I would get out there and start  
13 poling the Board, the members, and you can remind the  
14 members that, you know, we have the ability to bind them  
15 all, so they should really give thought to what they  
16 want to do, if they don't want to participate, they have  
17 to realize that in the greater interest of the entire  
18 VID, they need to be as cooperative as possible. I mean  
19 it will be fairly -- fairly -- they're gonna be paying  
20 the same amount, so.

21           MR. CUSICK: Right. Okay.

22           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

23           MR. CUSICK: I'll absolutely do that. I just --  
24 I'm not -- not to call anyone out, but we're all aware  
25 of how long this series of projects has gone.

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No. No, I think that -- I  
2 don't think there'll be a problem, but it's best to know  
3 what we're dealing with.

4           MR. CUSICK: Yeah. Okay. I'll chase it down.

5           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, please do. Thank you.

6           MR. CUSICK: Thanks, guys.

7           TRUSTEE CRAIG: In the meanwhile, put numbers  
8 together and, Joe, you had some soft costs that go with  
9 this, and Noah will have some soft costs.

10          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I think it's going to  
11 come in under \$500,000.

12          TRUSTEE CRAIG: I agree.

13          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think it'll be significantly  
14 over 400.

15          TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

16          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And that's about where it's  
17 gonna be. You meat that out over 12 properties in 10  
18 years, it's not a lot of money, not for --

19          TRUSTEE CRAIG: Right.

20          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- not for the better  
21 protection they'll be getting. I mean this will be a  
22 tremendous value to every one of those properties.

23          TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yup.

24          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: If they can have it.

25          TRUSTEE CRAIG: That's all I had.

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Yup.  All right.

2           Anybody else?  Any other Trustees have anything  
3 else they want to bring up at this point?

4           TRUSTEE GESSIN:  No.

5           MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  No?

6           TRUSTEE GESSIN:  No.

7           MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Gary, you got anything?

8           TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI:  No, I'm good.

9           MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  All right.

10          Let's to the Treasurer's Report.  Okay, you're  
11 on, sweetheart.

12          TREASURER VEGLIANTE:  Okay.  Where am I?  Hi,  
13 all.

14          I forwarded the bank statements and the reports  
15 to the Board of Trustees, accountant, attorney earlier  
16 today.  I also sent all the work stock papers for the  
17 tentative 21/22 budget, it's a preliminary budget.  I  
18 sent along all the paperwork that goes along with it so  
19 that you can review it, and if you have any questions,  
20 please let me know.  I tried to fill in as much as I  
21 could, so if you do have any questions, we can review  
22 that and then we're gonna setup a budget meeting  
23 tonight, we're going to setup the date, I believe, so --

24          MAYOR VEGLIANTE:  Yeah --

25          TREASURER VEGLIANTE:  -- that we can review this

1 and go over it before we have our -- before we adopt the  
2 budget.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You know --

4 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We also need to decide on  
5 the bond amounts, and then Charlene and I are almost  
6 finished with the Village audit, hopefully that's going  
7 to be complete soon. I think they have all the  
8 paperwork, so they're just reviewing the last of it and  
9 hopefully next month we can say it's complete.

10 And that's all I have.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You know, this has been an  
12 extraordinary year. Hold on. Okay. Hold on. All  
13 right. I can't find my meeting folks.

14 CLERK SADELI: On the bottom, Gary, click on the  
15 Zoom camera. That happened to me earlier. I closed  
16 up -- you'll see it's a little blue camera looking.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, I don't have it.

18 CLERK SADELI: Well, we can see you.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You can see me?

20 CLERK SADELI: Yeah.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'm going crazy. Hold on.  
22 How come my camera -- where the hell did it go? Oh,  
23 right here. Here it is. Okay, I'm back. Ta da.

24 All right. You know, unfortunately this has  
25 been an extraordinary year and our revenues were very

1 much down, for example, our -- our zoning fees that we  
2 had budgeted about six, about \$5,000, we got \$800.  
3 There's been -- you know, there's gonna be some holes in  
4 the budget from last year, but I don't anticipate them  
5 to continue.

6 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: There was -- Angela has a  
7 contractual amount that's over \$10,000, and we only  
8 budgeted \$5,500 and 8,500 of it is for Flynn, for the  
9 stenographer, since we've had Zoom meetings this year.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

11 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: So there's going to be a  
12 lot of different things that are changed because of what  
13 we had to deal with.

14 TREASURER TRIMARCHI: Hey, claire --

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

16 TREASURER TRIMARCHI: -- you want to see if you  
17 can let me in now?

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Angela, it's Gary, can you  
19 let him in?

20 CLERK SADELI: He's in.

21 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay.

22 He's in? Okay. I can hang up?

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay, I got it.

24 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay, good.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Is he in?

1 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, I think so.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, there he is. There we go.

3 So a bunch of our revenue stream was muted or --  
4 or knocked out completely. But we don't -- one thing  
5 that's positive is the mortgage tax, we've only received  
6 two of the four checks we get every year, and we're at  
7 almost \$30,000, which was far -- which we budgeted 45  
8 and we have two more checks coming, so I think -- I  
9 think that'll help us focus some of the loss, the  
10 losses.

11 Joe, also the franchise taxes on the cable and  
12 the other franchisees, I think that's about to be  
13 renegotiated; isn't it? Aren't we getting closer?

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We're coming up to the  
15 expiration of our -- of our contract, and it will be  
16 renegotiated, yes.

17 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: So we change the budget  
18 line item on that?

19 ATTORNEY PROKOP: To be conservative, I would  
20 leave it for the budget, I would leave it alone, I would  
21 leave it the same.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

24 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: All right. So we can pick  
25 this up, you know, at the next meeting. Everyone has a

1 copy that we can -- they can review and give me a call,  
2 and we can go through this.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Angela, how many delinquent  
4 taxes, how many do we have outstanding in delinquent  
5 tax?

6 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: \$40,000.

7 CLERK SADELI: About 40,000.

8 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right, Joe, you have to  
10 work on that and get that back.

11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I did all the -- the three  
12 people that are involved received Legal Notices about  
13 two and-a-half weeks ago.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: And the next step is the Board  
16 directed me to start an action to collect the taxes, I  
17 think in one case it might be con -- it might be  
18 confusion on the part of the taxpayer, and I'm going to  
19 reach out to that person.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

21 ATTORNEY PROKOP: And hopefully resolve it.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We've pretty much resolved all  
23 of them, we never really had a tax sale or a problem, so  
24 I believe most of that will be coming through.

25 All right. Let's -- Brian and Tim, you're on,



1 let's get you in here. Come on down and talk.

2 SERGEANT HENNIG: So I'm sure for those  
3 residents that have been spending some time out this  
4 winter we've had some very windy weather events. A lot  
5 of roof shingles, we're finding them in the street, on  
6 the ground. Just a little heads up to residents when  
7 you come out, take a look at your roof. You know, you  
8 might want to have somebody come and take a look at it.  
9 We are getting more calls for suspicious cars and people  
10 from people who aren't used to seeing land surveyors out  
11 and things like that, but we still encourage everybody,  
12 if you see something that doesn't look right, you know,  
13 please free to give us a call.

14 Another reminder, just for all the residents,  
15 you know, we're -- the season bonfire permits are much  
16 easier to obtain. We're still doing the same thing we  
17 did last year, just give us a call, we'll work with you  
18 to get you those permits that are good for the entire  
19 season.

20 Tim, do you have anything?

21 SERGEANT TURNER: No, you kinda covered it all.

22 SERGEANT HENNIG: Gary, we'll wait until the  
23 open forum at the end then to answer any questions?

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yup. Yup.

25 SERGEANT HENNIG: Okay.

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

2           Just one more thing, it wasn't on the agenda  
3 tonight, two of the things we've been talking about, and  
4 we're still looking into what kind of laws we can  
5 construct that will help us; one is, of course, the flag  
6 pole issue, which has been an issue for some residents  
7 on the ocean. We're trying to design something. Of  
8 course, as we all know, we can't and we wouldn't be  
9 involved in restricting someone from flying an American  
10 flag, but the fact is, we're trying to figure out how we  
11 can construct a law, you know, that will be somewhat  
12 helpful and yet not violate anyone's constitutional  
13 rights. The other law -- the other issue that we're  
14 involved in, it's not necessarily a law, but something I  
15 think we'd be ready to kind of put some requests for  
16 bids out on building what we would consider the -- a  
17 safety issue, and that would be something like a kayak  
18 or paddleboard rack down by the beach area off of Dune  
19 Lane. So we'll have -- we should have those bids in by  
20 the April meeting, and we should have something in  
21 concept to talk about for this season's flag pole law,  
22 probably by the April meeting, if anybody wanted to  
23 know. I'm just --

24           TRUSTEE CRAIG: Gary, where -- what location are  
25 you thinking about for the paddleboards --

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: On the are --

2           TRUSTEE CRAIG: -- or kayaks?

3           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: On the area of the beach by  
4 the water works walkway, just east of Dune Lane.

5           TRUSTEE CRAIG: Mm-hmm.

6           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: In that area. 'Cause there is  
7 a serious issue brought up by Dr. Brenner that people  
8 were just dropping paddleboards everywhere, putting  
9 their boats and beaching them onto the beach and just  
10 leaving them there all season without being monitored,  
11 and they were breaking loose and floating along the  
12 shoreline, so we, you know, have to really address that.  
13 I think by putting a rack up and getting -- getting them  
14 neatly stacked, we can, you know, maintain some civility  
15 there.

16          TREASURER VEGLIANTE: If anybody has any ideas.

17          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

18          TRUSTEE GESSIN: Do we need permission from the  
19 water district to do that?

20          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, that's something we  
21 should talk about --

22          TRUSTEE GESSIN: Okay.

23          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- off-line I think.

24          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: How big are these going to  
25 be built, these racks to hold how many boards?

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, like 10, I would say 10 or  
2 so. Maybe two 10 -- 10 kayak racks. I think that would  
3 accommodate most --

4           DR. BRENNER: Can you hear me, Gary?

5           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

6           DR. BRENNER: Right now there are about 14  
7 kayaks along the beach right now. And during the  
8 summertime that number goes up to about 30 or 40. Okay?  
9 And right now there are four, a total of four structures  
10 on my property that have been there for a year, so who's  
11 responsibility is that? There are three kayaks and a  
12 board that just lie on my property that were just left  
13 there. Who -- who --

14          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think you -- I think you  
15 could remove them if they're on your property and throw  
16 them away.

17          DR. BRENNER: And what do I -- what do I do with  
18 them?

19          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well --

20          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Sell them.

21          DR. BRENNER: -- I don't want them. I just want  
22 them off my property.

23          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Kick them out on the next high  
24 tide, let them float away.

25          DR. BRENNER: I thought about that, but I didn't

1 think that would be too decent, somebody would come  
2 after me with a meat cleaver.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Do you know who they belong  
4 to?

5 DR. BRENNER: No, I have no idea.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Brian and Timmy, do you have  
7 any suggestions?

8 SERGEANT HENNIG: No, I really don't, because,  
9 you know, kayaks aren't required to be registered,  
10 they're not required to have anyone's ownership or  
11 anything on them, you know, it's hard for some people,  
12 the people are all accessing it, you know, through  
13 the -- through that water authority property. The  
14 majority, the vast majority of them, are on -- on the  
15 county property. I'm not -- I don't know, Tim, do you  
16 have any suggestions?

17 SERGEANT TURNER: No, I'm thinking the same  
18 thing, since it's not registered, we can't find an  
19 owner. I'm not sure if the Village will take  
20 responsibility of removing them.

21 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I mean shouldn't they be  
22 considered trash if somebody just leaves them laying  
23 around?

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Absolute -- listen to me,  
25 whoever owns them has no claim to them if they're

1 trespassing on other people's property, the guy who owns  
2 the property can give them away. And I'm trying to  
3 think of some way that somebody may want to come down  
4 and take them.

5 AUDREY NELSON: I'm happy to do that. I mean we  
6 can take them to a local -- the surf shop, I mean --

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, like Durham.

8 AUDREY NELSON: Yeah, exactly, like that's  
9 completely what -- I mean I'm happy to do that. Um, how  
10 many are we talking about here?

11 DR. BRENNER: Four.

12 AUDREY NELSON: Yeah, I think we can make that  
13 happen.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, that's what I was  
15 thinking about calling Sean, yeah.

16 AUDREY NELSON: Yeah, exactly, Sean.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yup.

18 MICHAEL STERN: Well, it -- can I just make a  
19 suggestion? Like if the -- if everybody basically  
20 treats the county property as common storage, and  
21 there's a handful of them that aren't on --

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Nobody's said -- I just want  
23 you to -- nobody has said that, but go ahead.

24 MICHAEL STERN: Right, but people treat it that  
25 way, that's sort of been the practice for a long time,

1 but if that's a problem with the county, that's a  
2 different issue, but doesn't seem to be a problem at the  
3 moment and we're talking about potentially building  
4 racks or rails to facilitate that, so one suggestion is  
5 it may just not be clear to people where the county  
6 property stops and the private property of residents  
7 starts, and so maybe we can just drag them over to the  
8 county property, because that's what everybody thinks of  
9 as public storage. I know people spend a lot of time  
10 out there in the summer, and that's sort of at least  
11 treated as a public area. You know, if the county  
12 doesn't want to treat it as a public area, that's a  
13 whole different issue, but I assume people think they're  
14 storing things in a public area.

15           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't -- my personal view is  
16 these four or five or 10 kayaks probably belong to  
17 people who have rented and left the community, but if  
18 anybody believed that they can leave their boat in the  
19 water partially on somebody else's property in September  
20 and come back in May and expect to find that piece of  
21 property still there, they've really got to have a  
22 better -- I think they need to better supervise their  
23 own equipment. How you can leave a kayak on the beach  
24 and go home for the winter and expect to come back in  
25 the next spring and find it in a tidal area, such as we

1 have in Westhampton Dunes --

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: But it's a big project to  
3 drag them all the way into town to the surf shop and  
4 have somebody --

5 MR. STERN: You know, drag 'em over 50 feet  
6 they'll be on public property, you know, on county  
7 property, and either they'll be here in the summer or  
8 they won't, if they wash away, they wash away, nobody's  
9 going to do anything about that.

10 MS. NELSON: That's just trash going out in the  
11 ocean, why would we do that when we can proactively just  
12 donate them? That doesn't make any sense.

13 SERGEANT HENNIG: Gary, I'm going to interrupt.  
14 Gary, it's Brian. So I'm looking at the tax map, and it  
15 appears that they're -- 90 percent of them are on the  
16 county property and then there's a few that are actually  
17 on Hill's property, which is, you know, on the eastern  
18 side of that --

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yup.

20 SERGEANT HENNIG: -- county line. But my  
21 suggestion would be to not take this property that  
22 people have left there and they've been doing so for so  
23 many years, I'm not suggesting we use our resources, but  
24 maybe through Mike Burner, with the roadway  
25 Commissioner, or somebody, they can take these, put them



1 on the side of our office and people who are missing  
2 them can come and get them or we can discuss how they  
3 could possibly store them in a more responsible manner,  
4 rather than giving away residents' properties to, you  
5 know, to some type of a company.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We're got giving away a  
7 residents' property, residents have abandoned their  
8 property.

9 MR. HILL: Brian, Brian, thank you for that,  
10 this Daily.

11 TRUSTEE GESSIN: That was a good idea, Gary.

12 MR. HILL: Yeah, yeah, they've been abandoned  
13 for a long time, and I think it's great that people use  
14 it, but also people should take them home when they  
15 leave.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, it's a matter of respect  
17 for the community.

18 MR. HILL: Yeah.

19 MRS. HILL: Yeah, we have canoes and things on  
20 our property right now. They're way up, they blew into  
21 our yard, way up near the pool.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, well, every time the  
23 tied comes up they go a little bit.

24 MRS. HILL: One of them was air bound.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You have a problem, that's

1 very true.

2 DR. BRENNER: Gary, can you hear me?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

4 DR. BRENNER: It's Steve Brenner. Listen, I'm  
5 not against people, you know, taking their kayak and  
6 going into water.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Of course.

8 DR. BRENNER: But -- but if you go and take a  
9 look and see what it looks like, it's an eyesore. All  
10 right?

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Absolutely.

12 DR. BRENNER: There's kayak piled on top of  
13 kayak and there are catamarans along the shore. And,  
14 look, this past year was -- was a very different year.  
15 And, you know, I will tell you the major issue that  
16 existed this year was that there were people who rented  
17 houses for the whole summer, not just for two weeks.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

19 DR. BRENNER: Because they stayed out and they  
20 worked out here.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

22 DR. BRENNER: And there were no camps for little  
23 kids.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: True.

25 DR. BRENNER: So there were like 40 kids, which

1 was wonderful.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's fine.

3 DR. BRENNER: Yeah, yeah, that's great. But,  
4 you know, those people, each one of those kids had a  
5 little baby kayak, and the adults had adult kayaks and  
6 the adult kayak gave birth to little baby kayaks and  
7 now, you know, we have a community of kayaks which are  
8 here. Now I don't know what's gonna happen this summer,  
9 but if COVID is still around, the camps don't open, then  
10 you're gonna have a lot people again, and the same  
11 situation is gonna happen again. So there has to be a  
12 little bit more decorum. I believe --

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think, Brian, we should put  
14 up some signage.

15 SERGEANT HENNIG: Absolutely. Absolutely.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Brian's concept is great,  
17 because if somebody comes to the constabulary to collect  
18 their kayaks, they have to be spoken to and say, look,  
19 if you leave it there again next season, you're gonna  
20 loose it. And, by the way, you don't leave it on  
21 private property. We should have a conversation once  
22 people come to collect. Or if we put a sign up that  
23 says if you don't mind your own kayak --

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Give it away.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Don't leave it on private

1 property. And don't leave it here seasonally. But I  
2 think that gives us an opportunity, I'll speak to Mike  
3 Burner tomorrow and see if he has somebody that could  
4 come down and maybe help collect them and bring them  
5 over to the constabulary.

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: How many are there? How  
7 many are laying there?

8 DR. BRENNER: Now? Now?

9 SERGEANT HENNIG: Yes.

10 DR. BRENNER: There's about 30 of them.

11 SERGEANT HENNIG: There's a lot.

12 TRUSTEE GESSIN: 30?

13 SERGEANT HENNIG: There's also some catamarans,  
14 too, Gary.

15 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Yeah, but you know what, 30  
16 sounds like they're abandoned.

17 DR. BRENNER: Well, I think a lot of them are  
18 abandoned, yeah.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Or we can have a sale  
20 beginning of the summer.

21 MRS. HILL: A fundraiser.

22 (Laughter)

23 DR. BRENNER: The issue with the catamarans,  
24 those catamarans belong to people in the Village, they  
25 just don't want to keep 'em on their property. So

1 there's a shoreline on where the water company is so  
2 they just leave their catamarans there, and when they go  
3 out in the water, they bring it to their house, and then  
4 they bring it back over to the property again. Now they  
5 have property on the water. Why wouldn't they use their  
6 own property?

7 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Hey, Gary, I really like  
8 Brian's idea of bringing them over to the Constables.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, I think we'll bring them  
10 over to the Constables.

11 TRUSTEE GESSIN: This way you'll know which ones  
12 are abandoned and which ones are reclaimed.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's right. But as far as  
14 the catamarans go, Steve, you know, there's very little  
15 that we can do about that, unless, of course, they're  
16 between private property. You know --

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Gary, we have a boat storage law  
18 in the Village, we have a boat storage law in the  
19 Village, and you're not allowed to do it during the  
20 winter. So why would wouldn't it fall under that?

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, no, boat storage you're  
22 not allowed to store in your front yard.

23 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Front yard, right.

24 TRUSTEE CRAIG: So there is no yard, so maybe we  
25 alter our boat storage law to handle abandoned kayaks.

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think we were encouraging  
2 the people to put those boats, kayaks, whatever, in  
3 their side yards at one point.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, no. Look --

5 MR. GREEN: Can I say something?

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- I really think that if  
7 somebody has a catamaran, they're going to maintain it,  
8 and if they realize it's on private property, they'll  
9 move it. I think we can convince those people easily,  
10 because most people make the investment in a catamaran  
11 don't want to, you know, are responsible enough and  
12 don't want to loose the catamaran, so I think that won't  
13 be a problem.

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Why would they leave it  
15 there?

16 MR. GREEN: Gary, can I say something?

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Sure. Alan.

18 MR. GREEN: Okay. There are 14 cata -- kayaks  
19 there, I counted them last week. And there are two  
20 canoes, so those are easy enough to be hauled away.  
21 Last year was an exceptional year, kids were actually  
22 having a summer camp right next door us, and they had a  
23 lot of kayaks and stuff and parents were not running a  
24 summer camp, but they had a lot of kids there. And they  
25 left them there. Now that was an exception.

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

2           MR. GREEN: There's never been that many. I  
3 would count maybe four every year that are left, five  
4 maybe, and this year --

5           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

6           MR. GREEN: -- was really ridiculous. Okay, so  
7 we put signs on them and say next year you don't leave  
8 these or they're taken away. Most of the people  
9 actually didn't live right around there. There's one  
10 boat there that's from a guy whose been on the -- whose  
11 lived here for many years. It's a rubber raft. And  
12 it's there, and it's on the county property, and he just  
13 bought it, so he left it there and he probably didn't  
14 know what to do with it, or maybe he didn't have his son  
15 there. Anyway, there's two kayaks, I have one kayak  
16 that I can't put on my property, I basically 'cause --  
17 it's a catamaran, I'm sorry, that would float away in  
18 the -- in the wintertime. And it's on a rack that's  
19 actually built for it, it's been there for years and  
20 years, and it's on county property, so that shouldn't be  
21 a problem. The other catamaran is Dave, who lives down  
22 the block, and I've helped him haul it up on occasion.  
23 And he was going to take it away, but I know something  
24 happened in his family, so he didn't.

25           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

1 MR. GREEN: So that will be there, mine will be  
2 there unless --

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

4 MR. GREEN: -- someone has to haul it away.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. I --

6 MR. STERN: Can -- can I make -- can I make a  
7 comment?

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Go ahead.

9 MR. STERN: That I don't know what's happened in  
10 past years, but I can tell you that in this year in the  
11 summer, um, I was down there, uh, periodically with my  
12 kids and it is the most wonderful expression of  
13 community you can imagine that was going on.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Absolutely.

15 MR. STERN: There were --

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't think anybody  
17 disagrees with that, Mike.

18 MR. STERN: No, but let me make the following  
19 observation. People were using each other's kayaks.  
20 There was a general view when people would come down  
21 they'd say these are my three kids' kayaks, feel free to  
22 use them whenever you come down, and it was mostly  
23 residents, I know -- I know who the people were. And I  
24 can tell you that it is an impossibility if you don't  
25 have bay front property to drag down three kids' kayaks



1 to go play with your kids for an hour. And so the idea  
2 that the county or the water department has not objected  
3 to a handful of kayaks or maybe a dozen or more being  
4 stored on their property for the season is one of the  
5 nice things about this community, so I think dragging  
6 everybody's kayaks up to the Constable station and  
7 saying, you know, pickup your junk, um, look, it's the  
8 winter, it's an odd situation, but I think -- I think  
9 that will -- will really have a chilling effect on  
10 what's a really nice part of the community. I don't  
11 think anything should be on anybody's personal property,  
12 I think that should get resolved, whether that's by  
13 bringing things to the Constable's station or  
14 dragging them back onto the --

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's basically what we were  
16 saying, Mike.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, that's what we were  
18 talking about.

19 MR. STERN: But there's only four kayaks I  
20 understand that are on private property, other than  
21 county property, the vast majority of this is on county  
22 property, and if we go send a construction crew down  
23 there to pick everything up, you know --

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, no, no, no. I don't  
25 think that we were implying that we were going to pick

1 anything up off of the county property.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, no, you misunderstood.  
3 What we were talking about is building racks down on the  
4 county water department property.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Which we really can't be  
7 discussing too publicly because we have no right to  
8 build a rack on county property. However, if racks were  
9 to appear there, I'm sure people would use them, that's  
10 fine, we're not arguing that. What the -- what we were  
11 addressing is the kayaks that are left on private  
12 property, which is inconsiderate, at the very least, to  
13 the property owner. Those --

14 CLERK SADELI: Gary -- I'm sorry.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- those are the ones that  
16 we're focusing on having removed and brought down to the  
17 constabulary.

18 MR. STERN: And we understand there's maybe four  
19 of those, right, four or six or whatever?

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Whatever. There may be four,  
21 there may be 14, Mike, it doesn't really matter. That's  
22 what we're addressing. Because if it's only four and  
23 it's on your property you don't -- you have -- you have  
24 a --

25 MR. STERN: I know, listen, I have no objection

1 to removing stuff from people's property if they don't  
2 want it there.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Good.

4 MR. STERN: I'm talking about the county  
5 property.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well --

7 MR. STERN: And I think -- I think some of the  
8 discussion at least was conflating -- was conflating the  
9 whole operation, which was there were a lot of kayaks  
10 there, and it's an eyesore and it's on people's  
11 property, you know, the specific concerns about a  
12 handful of kayaks being on -- on people's property,  
13 which I agree, you know, you shouldn't have stuff on  
14 your property if you don't want it there.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. And frankly there's  
16 nothing we can do on the county property with the kayaks  
17 that are there, we have no right to remove those. But  
18 we do -- we do have the right to protect the interest of  
19 our residents, and that's really what we're addressing.  
20 You know, so I think that we have it pretty well  
21 focused. I'll speak to the road Commissioner and see if  
22 we can get some guys down there to clean off what's on  
23 private property.

24 If anyone has private property with a kayak or a  
25 boat or anything that's doesn't belong to them, to let

1 us know, and we'll see if we can get it off.

2 CLERK SADELI: Gary, do you want me to read some  
3 of the comments?

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. Sure. Yeah.

5 CLERK SADELI: So Carl Landeck said he believes  
6 that in this community everybody cares about everybody  
7 enough, that's what makes this Village special.

8 And I think it's Gloria, not Steve Ferruggia,  
9 who suggested, would it make sense to find a way to  
10 label or mark these so if we need to reach out to the  
11 people we can, thinking more of a future state here so  
12 we have to solve this only once.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: There's nothing we can solve  
14 only once in this community. If we found something we  
15 could solve only once, I'd be a happy guy, but no, I  
16 think they're all good. I don't think anyone -- there  
17 may have been a misunderstanding, but I don't think  
18 anyone is complaining that somebody's using the county  
19 water department's property to enjoy themselves, nobody  
20 here wants to stop that, and I'm sorry if we gave that  
21 impression. I think what we want to address is clearly  
22 the fact that people have left property on other  
23 people's property. That has to be removed. And we  
24 will. And we'll move them down to the constabulary, and  
25 if somebody's looking for their kayak, they'll come and

1 talk to the Constables. I think that's the easiest way.  
2 And the Constables can express to them, look, you can't  
3 leave it on somebody else's property, it's a very -- I  
4 think, it's a community-based where you're dealing with.

5 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Right.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Does anybody else have  
7 anything to say on that?

8 MS. FERRUGGIA: Me, me, me.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Go, go, go, Gloria.  
10 Let Gloria speak, Ang.

11 CLERK SADELI: Oh, okay, yeah, I thought she  
12 unmuted herself.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Unmute her. Hold on, Gloria.  
14 Okay, you're on.

15 MS. FERRUGGIA: Can you hear me?

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

17 CLERK SADELI: Yes.

18 MS. FERRUGGIA: No, I was just gonna say that  
19 wasn't me.

20 CLERK SADELI: Oh, is there another Ferruggia  
21 over there?

22 MS. FERRUGGIA: Yes, my son, my one and only,  
23 Steven.

24 CLERK SADELI: Oh, I said Steve, but I just  
25 imag -- thought that it was you because I think last

1 time it said something else and it was you.

2 MS. FERRUGGIA: Oh, probably, yes, but, you  
3 know, I just don't want to steal his ideas, so it was  
4 Steven.

5 CLERK SADELI: Steal his thunder.

6 MR. FERRUGGIA: Steal his thunder, that's it.  
7 Bye.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right, Gloria, bye-bye.

9 GLORIA FERRUGGIA: See you soon.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. So just a  
11 reminder, have a great St. Paddy's Day, everybody, which  
12 is coming up tomorrow morning.

13 And we'll go onto the Motions.

14 Oh, Joe, we have the Village Attorney Report.

15 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Attorney Report.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Come on, Joe, bore us some  
17 more. Go ahead, you're on, Joe.

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I attended a virtual meeting  
19 today with Senator Schumer. And Senator Schumer with  
20 the NYCOM representatives. Senator Schumer explained  
21 the method of calculation of relief that's going to be  
22 spread among the 19,000 municipalities that exist in the  
23 United States, so there's 19,000 municipalities in the  
24 United States. And there's roughly 30 billion dollars  
25 that's going to be spread among them. The -- it's going

1 to be done based on the population of the 2019 Census.  
2 I think our population is -- was 20 or 30 in that  
3 Census, but we will fight for our share.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, we will.

5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: But the main problem, as he  
6 sees it, is going to be to try to keep the states from  
7 sort of glomming the money, which is what happened with  
8 the super storm money.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yup.

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: With the super storm, 55  
11 million dollars -- 55 billion dollars was awarded by the  
12 Congress to help the communities of New York State, and  
13 it made it as far as New York State, and New York State  
14 hung onto the money and it's actually just now getting  
15 out to the local municipalities 10 or 12 years after.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's not going to the  
17 villages.

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We need to have a Motion to  
19 set a Public Hearing on March 31st for the tax cap  
20 exemption.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So can I have a Motion to do  
23 that?

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll do the Motions after  
25 this.

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Motion.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, okay. All right.

3 Let's do the Motions.

4 Motion to adopt a Resolution approving the claim  
5 vouchers for the Board of Trustees for the Village.

6 Motion?

7 TRUSTEE EFF: John.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Second?

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Gary.

10 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Harvey. Aye.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Harvey.

12 All in favor?

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Aye.

14 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Aye.

15 TRUSTEE EFF: Aye.

16 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Aye.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: None opposed.

18 Motion to adopt a Resolution waiving the reading  
19 of the minutes of the February's meeting.

20 Motion. Michael.

21 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Michael.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Second by Gary.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yes.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor?

25 TRUSTEE EFF: Aye.



1 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Aye.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Aye.

3 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Aye.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: None opposed.

5 Motion to approve the Corona Virus Pandemic

6 Action Plan.

7 Harvey?

8 TRUSTEE GESSIN: I'll make a Motion.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Second by John.

10 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor.

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Aye.

13 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Aye.

14 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Aye.

15 TRUSTEE EFF: Aye.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: None opposed.

17 Motion to approve a bond for the Village

18 Improvement District.

19 Joe, do we have it?

20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, we're not -- we're going

21 to do that on March 31st.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

23 Motion to approve a Resolution to set the date

24 of March 31st, 2021 for a Public Hearing for the Local

25 Law to pierce the 2% percent tax cap.

1 Motion?

2 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Michael.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Michael. Seconded by?

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Gary.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Gary.

6 All in favor?

7 TRUSTEE EFF: Aye.

8 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Eye.

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Aye.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Aye.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe, do we need a Motion to  
12 have a budget meeting?

13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We need a budget meeting  
14 between now -- a budget hearing -- we need a budget  
15 meeting -- yes, so what day would you like to do that?

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Let's do it on the 31st.

17 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay, we can do it on the  
18 31st.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We can do it via Zoom.

20 TRUSTEE EFF: What day is that?

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What day is the 31st?

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: 31st is a Wednesday.

23 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, I can't do it.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's no good for John.

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: What about Monday or Tuesday, 29

1 or 30?

2 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, either of those days would  
3 be all right.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Let's --

5 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I can do any of the three.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Let's do it on Tuesday.

7 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: I can't do Tuesday.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Why?

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Well, what are we talking  
10 about, the 30th?

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, let's do it on  
12 April 1st.

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: What about the other  
14 meeting, why don't we do it all at one time?

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: April 1st is good for you  
16 guys?

17 TRUSTEE EFF: What day is April 1st?

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's Thursday.

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: April 1st is Thursday.

20 TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah, that's fine.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: April Fool's Day.

22 CLERK SADELI: So the 31st and then the 1st?

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: April 1st.

24 CLERK VEGLIANTE: Why don't we do it on one day?  
25 Can't we do it all in one day?

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So why don't we do the -- why  
2 don't we do the Motion for Resolution for the Public --  
3 for the cap pierce the same day. Why don't we do them  
4 both on Thursday, April 1?

5           Joe?

6           CLERK SADELI: Does that work, Joe?

7           ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay, fine.

8           TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay.

9           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

10          TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We mise well do them all  
11 at the same time.

12          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

13          ATTORNEY PROKOP: You know, it's a Holy day, I'm  
14 not sure if you want to do that, but it's up to you.

15          TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Holy day, Holy Thursday.

16          CLERK SADELI: Holy Thursday.

17          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, we can go to mass in the  
18 morning.

19          ATTORNEY PROKOP: So let me -- Gary, let me just  
20 explain to you, this is -- this is a meeting to discuss  
21 the budget. We have --

22          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

23          ATTORNEY PROKOP: -- to have a budget hearing by  
24 April 15th.

25          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

1           ATTORNEY PROKOP: So you need to decide the date  
2 of the budget hearing also.

3           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, why don't we do the  
4 budget hearing on the 15th or the 14th, whichever day is  
5 good. What dates are the 14th and 15th of April?

6           CLERK SADELI: 14th is Wednesday.

7           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Wednesday's no good.

8           TRUSTEE EFF: Yeah.

9           CLERK SADELI: And the 15th --

10          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: 15th is Thursday.

11          TRUSTEE CRAIG: It doesn't give us any time  
12 to -- if something comes up.

13          CLERK SADELI: I would do it --

14          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right on the edge.

15          CLERK SADELI: -- what do you think about the  
16 9th, Friday the 9th?

17          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: How about Thursday the 8th.

18          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'll do it.

19          TRUSTEE EFF: That's fine.

20          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Thursday the 8th?

21          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah.

22          TRUSTEE CRAIG: All right.

23          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Angela, you're gonna send out  
24 an invite?

25          ATTORNEY PROKOP: Wait. Wait. Hold on. The

1 budget -- the budget has to be ready and in a tentative  
2 form.

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Two weeks before.

4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah, 10 days before the  
5 budget hearing.

6 CLERK SADELI: So if it's April 1st it needs to  
7 be the 12th, right?

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: April 1st is a Thursday. So  
9 that's not two weeks.

10 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah, it's not enough time, it's  
11 eight days. So --

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: So we have to push it up.

13 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I would propose to do it Monday,  
14 the 29th, March 29th, and then --

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Friday night?

16 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Not Friday, it's Monday.

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Monday, the 29th, yeah, okay.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That's fine.

19 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes, that's fine.

20 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Then you have one, two, three,  
21 four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, the 8th is the  
22 tenth day, Joe, is that enough time?

23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's 10 days, yeah.

24 TRUSTEE CRAIG: 15th will be the tenth day, so  
25 is that all right?

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: That would be okay.

2 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay.

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: So, Angela, March 29th?

4 CLERK SADELI: Is the budget meeting?

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right.

6 CLERK SADELI: The budget hearing is going to be  
7 April 8th.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay. So you'll send out an  
9 invite to us, right?

10 CLERK SADELI: Yes.

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: 'Cause we're gonna do a  
12 Zoom?

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

14 CLERK SADELI: Yes.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: And then we have another  
16 meeting after that, right, a regular meeting?

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And then we have to do the  
18 Village meeting April, Ang?

19 CLERK SADELI: Yeah. We can do that the 20th.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, we can do the Village  
21 meeting on the 20th.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Works.

23 TRUSTEE EFF: What day is the 20th?

24 CLERK SADELI: It's a Tuesday.

25 TRUSTEE EFF: All right.

1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I may not be in town. Can we  
2 do it on a Thursday?

3           TRUSTEE CRAIG: Well, let's wait 'til the 8th.

4           TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You'd be on Zoom.

5           TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay.

6           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's true. We can do Zoom,  
7 that's right.

8           TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

9           CLERK SADELI: Max agrees.

10          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What?

11          CLERK SADELI: I said Max agrees.

12          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, Max agrees.

13          TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay. So we're set for the  
14 29th.

15          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. We got everything  
16 down.

17          TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yup, 29th, March 29th is  
18 the hearing, and the 8th is the day we pass it.

19          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's correct.

20          TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay.

21          MAYOR VEGLIANTE: In the meantime, guys, the  
22 preliminary budget, go over it, we'll talk about it,  
23 we'll get it ready, so then when we have the budget  
24 meeting, we're up to speed, okay?

25          TRUSTEE GESSIN: Okay.



1           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It looks like we may have an  
2 increase, this may be the first year we ever pierced the  
3 tax cap, I don't know, but we'll see.

4           TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What's causing that?

5           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, we didn't get the  
6 income, we got very little income. We had no permits  
7 and no zoning fees, you know, just the impact, the extra  
8 cost of the COVID.

9           TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: In your year of record  
10 breaking sales.

11           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, we got more budget -- we  
12 don't get any money from record breaking sales other  
13 than the mortgage tax.

14           TRUSTEE CRAIG: Mortgages.

15           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Mortgage tax, that is -- we're  
16 well over in mortgage money.

17           TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

18           TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: So where are we loosing it?

19           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What?

20           TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Where are we loosing it?

21           MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, most of the other  
22 income. We had no zoning fees, you know, I don't -- I  
23 don't know yet, but we may pierce the cap. I don't  
24 know. We'll see. We're gonna work hard not to. Go  
25 over the budget, look at it, and we'll see. We're one

1 of the very few Villages in New York State that doesn't  
2 pierce the cap every year. Because, remember, the 2% --

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It's kinda tough to compare  
4 us to the rest of New York State because our taxes are  
5 already through the roof, no?

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well --

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I mean you can compare it  
8 to, um, I don't know, someplace else in Suffolk County,  
9 Manorville.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You want to compare it to --

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We have to work on our  
12 taxes.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, see what they -- when  
14 they rent their house for two weeks, see how much they  
15 get for it, Gary. The fact of the matter is, it is what  
16 it is, the increases are not due to any extravagant  
17 spending, it's unfortunate, and I don't even know if we  
18 are gonna pierce the cap yet, but we'll see.

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We've done so well all these  
20 years without piercing that 2%.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well --

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Maybe we won't.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I believe we still will. But  
24 I don't know. Let's go over it and we'll see.

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah. We always we do as best

1 as we can.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah --

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We haven't pierced it in years,  
4 so.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And by the way --

7 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Our insurance costs, our fire  
8 protection has gone up.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Fire protection's gone up a  
10 significant amount, insurance costs have gone up a  
11 significant amount and healthcare costs went up.

12 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I mean COVID is impacting us  
14 on every level, but we'll see. I think the -- you know,  
15 there's not been any extraordinary or exceptional costs  
16 in the running of the Village, other than the usual  
17 costs, healthcare, you know, it's -- you know, we're not  
18 getting any state aid. I know, even though my good  
19 friend, Chuck Schumer, likes to tell us we're gonna get  
20 money, we've heard that song many times.

21 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Yes, we have.

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It's really Cuomo.

23 CLERK SADELI: Except I think the money is going  
24 to towns.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What's that?

1 CLERK SADELI: Lots of towns look like they were  
2 getting it.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Towns and counties are getting  
4 it, the village is not.

5 CLERK SADELI: Yes. He doesn't like villages.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, but this Governor has  
7 enough problems that we may not have to worry about him.  
8 He's got -- he's got to worry about history.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: He won't be around much  
10 longer.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't think so.

12 CLERK SADELI: Do we want to open it for public  
13 comments?

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

15 CLERK SADELI: If anybody wants to raise their  
16 hand that has a question.

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay, everybody, say what you  
19 want, we're here.

20 It's great to have this many people on the  
21 meeting. And I think we have what, 40, Angela?

22 CLERK SADELI: Well, there was 49.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

24 CLERK SADELI: Now we're down to 42, I guess  
25 some people didn't like our kayak conversation.

1 TRUSTEE CRAIG: For a source of revenue we can  
2 rent out the ones that have been abandoned.

3 (Laughter)

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right, guys, anybody want  
5 to say anything, we're here, come on. This is it.

6 Any questions? Any concerns you have?

7 No, Max, not you.

8 CLERK SADELI: I was gonna say, Max has a  
9 comment.

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I want to recognize that we  
11 have a new stenographer tonight, Donna Ritzmann. And  
12 thank -- that's who you see on your screen, Donna  
13 Ritzmann, is taking this, and I guess Flynn is sending  
14 the big guns tonight. And I'd like to thank her for  
15 taking time away from her family to do this tonight,  
16 that was very nice of her.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, thank you, Donna.

18 THE COURT REPORTER: You're welcome.

19 CLERK SADELI: Dr. Wang as a question.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

21 CLERK SADELI: I'll unmute him.

22 DR. WANG: Hi, everybody.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Hello.

24 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Hello.

25 MR. WANG: So you probably can guess what I'm

1 going to ask. Do you have any updates on the easement  
2 issue?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think I spoke with Elizabeth  
4 Dale, who is Chris Kent's associate, and she said she  
5 was getting everything together. She felt very positive  
6 that it was going well. I did not speak to anyone at  
7 the BBPA, but Mr. Renn's attorney feels that it's moving  
8 along. I don't have much more information than that.

9 Joe, do you have any information?

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The last time I spoke to  
11 Mr. Renn's attorney he was putting together the  
12 documents, that was subject to his speaking to the BBPA,  
13 but he felt that he was very close.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think the biggest hitch was  
15 that they were using Floyd Carrington for our surveyor,  
16 and they were waiting to get those documents from Floyd,  
17 but they're certainly moving along. I mean they've  
18 retained a surveyor to actually detail it out. I don't  
19 think they -- I think that's very positive.

20 MR. WANG: Is there anybody from the BBPA that  
21 wants to make a comment tonight to add to that  
22 information?

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'd love to hear it. I don't  
24 think anybody's on.

25 MS. WOLF: Yeah, I'm here.

1 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, Catherine's on.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

3 MS. WOLF: Am I unmuted?

4 CLERK SADELI: Yes.

5 MS WOLF: Hi, there.

6 CLERK SADELI: Hi, Catherine.

7 MS. WOLF: Yes, last we've -- I had  
8 conversations this week with our attorney and had  
9 mentioned that we -- he had mentioned we still have not  
10 received anything yet. And he reached out again and my  
11 understanding as of -- today's Tuesday -- yesterday  
12 afternoon, he received a first draft of an easement  
13 proposal. That's my -- I haven't spoken to him live  
14 since then, but he emailed me that he did get something,  
15 so he's reviewing it, and that's really only update I  
16 have at this point, and that was as of, you know, 4:30  
17 yesterday afternoon. So I will be speaking with him as  
18 soon as he has a chance to go over it and start the  
19 process of -- of checking it out.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. That would be great.  
21 Great.

22 MS. WOLF: So we are, you know, on -- as on top  
23 of it as we can be.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Good.

25 MS. WOLF: We are watching and -- and hopeful

1 that things can move forward.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Great. Thank you.

3 MR. WANG: So --

4 MS. WOLF: You're welcome.

5 MR. WANG: So -- thank you. So that means that  
6 we're not quite to the point of doing the survey yet  
7 then since we're one step behind them, just to clarify?

8 MS. WOLF: No.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, Elizabeth Dale told me  
10 that they were -- that they had retained Floyd  
11 Carrington. I would imagine -- I mean -- I don't think  
12 Catherine would know.

13 MS. WOLF: No, it's because it's not up to us to  
14 do that, so we're --

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Waiting for them.

16 MS. WOLF: Yeah, just waiting to hear. But I  
17 can certainly ask that question when I speak with our  
18 attorney, if he knows anything further about it.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

20 MS. FERRUGGIA: Do you know that the police now  
21 have --

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'm sorry. Gloria?

23 MS. FERRUGGIA: Oh, can you hear me?

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

25 MS. FERRUGGIA: Oh, how the hell did that



1 happen? Good thing I didn't -- good thing I didn't  
2 curse. You know what I was gonna -- I was going  
3 through, and I'm just wondering, maybe I'm just late to  
4 the game here, what is going to happen with the building  
5 that is now where the Constables are housed?

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, we have some need for  
7 the use of it, some of it for some of the recordkeeping  
8 that we have, and we -- the Village intends to maintain  
9 that building.

10 MS. FERRUGGIA: Oh, so it's still going to be --  
11 you're not tearing down that structure?

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No. No.

13 MS. FERRUGGIA: Oh, good. Okay, all right, I  
14 just was wondering what, you know --

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Nope.

16 MS. FERRUGGIA: -- what was gonna happen down  
17 there. Okay.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's -- we're very much  
19 looking forward to redesigning the whole Village as far  
20 as the properties we have use of.

21 MS. FERRUGGIA: Maybe you should open a  
22 pizzeria.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Oh, Gloria.

24 MS. FERRUGGIA: Okay, thanks, guys.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You're welcome.

1 MS. FERRUGGIA: See you in the summer.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Soon. Soon.

3 MS. FERRUGGIA: Yup. Yup.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Although today is freezing --

5 MS. FERRUGGIA: I know.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- out on the beach. It is

7 cold.

8 MS. FERRUGGIA: Stay safe everybody, okay?

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Thank you.

10 CLERK SADELI: Bye, Gloria.

11 MS. FERRUGGIA: Bye.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Be well.

13 Okay, if anybody else has any other comments,  
14 this is the time.

15 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Joe, do you have anything else,  
16 any -- any updates with anything going on?

17 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No. I think we covered -- I  
18 think everybody covered in their own -- in their own  
19 reports anything that I would have brought up.

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Are we all up-to-date on  
21 656?

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Any more issues?

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We should vote to reject the  
25 electric bids so we can get that moving, that's the one

1 last Resolution we need.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So --

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I don't think --

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: -- what are we rejecting, the  
5 underground lines?

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, we're just rejecting  
7 whether we're going to need temp power for when the  
8 crane gets near the box --

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, we're just rejecting the  
10 whole thing, Gary, we're just rejecting the whole thing,  
11 because want to bring 200 amp service in, we're gonna  
12 re-bid it.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, that's all.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: 200 amps is not a lot in  
16 today's world, especially since you're gonna have  
17 electric heat.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, yeah, maybe, maybe we  
19 shoot for 300.

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, no, it's more than you  
21 need. 200, very safe. More than enough. More than  
22 we'll ever use in that size of a building.

23 TRUSTEE EFF: Well, we're putting electric heat  
24 in that building?

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There are heat pumps.

1 TRUSTEE EFF: All right, okay.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Heat pumps.

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: But they're run by electric,  
4 they're much more economical than gas or oil.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So we can decide that later,  
7 but for tonight so we can move ahead, we need to reject  
8 the bid.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay.

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The electric bid.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

12 Motion to reject the electric bid?

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Motion.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Gary.

15 TRUSTEE EFF: Second.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Second by John.

17 TRUSTEE EFF: John.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor?

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Aye.

20 TRUSTEE EFF: Aye.

21 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Aye.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Aye.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: None opposed.

24 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I don't believe -- I don't  
25 believe we awarded any bids tonight. But I know there

1 was the question about the demo bid which you wanted to  
2 clarify, right?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, but we awarded the piling.

4 TRUSTEE GESSIN: We awarded the piling.

5 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We did award that?

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

7 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We voted on it?

8 TRUSTEE GESSIN: We did.

9 CLERK SADELI: No, we didn't.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I don't remember voting --

11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We didn't award any bids  
12 tonight.

13 CLERK SADELI: We didn't, we didn't award the  
14 bid, you said that you were going to interview them.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No --

16 CLERK SADELI: For the demo.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Demo.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You're talking about two  
19 things, you're talking about pilings and you're talking  
20 about demo.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right, we reviewed demo, I  
22 believe, I believe we made a Motion to award the piling  
23 to Brandt.

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I agree.

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We didn't make that Motion.

1 CLERK SADELI: We didn't make the Motion, but we  
2 did say that.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: So you want to make a Motion  
5 to award him the job?

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Harvey, Harvey, you reviewed it  
7 closely, so why don't you do it?

8 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Okay. I'd like to make a  
9 Motion to award the piling project to Brandt Marine for  
10 a total price of \$27,843.

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Second.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor?

13 TRUSTEE GESSIN: All in favor?

14 TRUSTEE EFF: Aye.

15 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Aye.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Aye.

17 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Aye.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: None opposed.

19 And then that's all we're bidding, that's all  
20 we're awarding.

21 TRUSTEE CRAIG: That's all we're doing, yup.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right.

23 CLERK SADELI: So anybody want to make a Motion  
24 to close the meeting?

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Motion to adjourn.

2 CLERK SADELI: Ha, ha, Mike.

3 TRUSTEE GESSIN: I'll second.

4 (Laughter)

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Mike seconded.

6 All in favor?

7 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Goodnight, guys. Thank you.

8 TRUSTEE EFF: Goodnight everybody.

9 CLERK SADELI: Goodnight.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Goodnight. Happy St.

11 Patrick's Day.

12 CLERK SADELI: Happy St. Patrick's Day.

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Happy St. Patrick's Day.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Stay well.

15 (The Meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.)
