1 (Whereupon the meeting was called
2 to order at 7:34 p.m.)

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Ladies
4 and gentlemen, we're going to start the
5 meeting. Unfortunately we'll have to
6 waive the Pledge of Allegiance, but
7 keep it in your mind because we need to
8 be pledging allegiance lately. All
9 right. We're going to start with 656
10 Dune Road. That of course has been
11 almost --

12 CLERK SADELI: Gary, can we wait
13 one second?

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

15 CLERK SADELI: Just because I
16 can't take notes and I just want to
17 make sure I get Mr. Atanasio in. Okay.
18 Sorry. He's going to try again.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Who's that?

20 CLERK SADELI: Mr. Atanasio. I
21 think he didn't put in enough of the
22 code.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Is he
24 going to try to join us by phone?

25 CLERK SADELI: He's going to try

1 and join us by phone now.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: If he joins us,
3 maybe we'll put him on first because he
4 may have trouble staying on.

5 CLERK SADELI: Right. I'll look
6 for him.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

8 CLERK SADELI: You were going to
9 start with 656, right?

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yup, 656A Dune
11 Road. We've had nothing but trouble
12 from the Department of State regarding
13 this application. They've made every
14 hurdle nearly impossible to overcome,
15 but we've done that. We've met all of
16 their requirements. They now have just
17 sent us a letter earlier this week
18 claiming that although it meets all of
19 the code requirements they would like
20 to see the bathroom situated
21 differently and include, you know, a
22 non-gender oriented bathroom. We said
23 simply this is not a public facility,
24 while it is a public building, it is
25 the police department, and we have

1 designed the building to be to the best
2 use. We meet all the codes. Either
3 you give us out permit or we're going
4 to go to court. It's simple. They are
5 clearly trying to be just difficult,
6 and I think that's a remnant from the
7 old governor, Governor Cuomo, who
8 seemed to have a bug up somewhere about
9 our Village, and he's been an adversary
10 of ours for a long time. Now that he's
11 gone I expect that to change. So do we
12 have anything else you want to say?

13 Gary, do you want to say anything about
14 it? You have to un-mute yourself.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: So let me just
16 say it a little bit differently. The
17 last suggestion they made was a
18 suggestion how we would arrange locks
19 on the entries of the locker room
20 itself and then to the bathroom itself.
21 That was what it was all about, and
22 it's ridiculous.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Arrange locks on
24 the door.

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, locks on

1 the door, that's what it referred to,
2 you're right, locks on the door so
3 nobody gets locked in and nobody walks
4 into somebody else. It's nonsense. I
5 believe it's nonsense.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Absolutely.

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I spoke to
8 Maria today. Maria said we should just
9 say to them if you don't want to do it,
10 which might be the better way to go
11 than to compromise and do it and then
12 have to resubmit it again, just say to
13 them no, we're fine with this, and we
14 are moving forward.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: And that's a
17 direction Joe should be having right
18 now to respond to DOS.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We're going to
20 send an architect's letter saying that
21 this is architecturally --

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'm sorry,
23 from the architect.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. It's
25 Architecturally correct, it meets all

1 the codes, thank you for the
2 suggestion, but go jump in a lake.

3 CLERK SADELI: We had Bob take the
4 e-mail that Maria sent from the State
5 over to Nick Vero's office, and I told
6 him he needed to have the letter done
7 by Wednesday, and Bob will go back over
8 there tomorrow.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We all should
10 -- that letter should get pushed
11 around, you know, so everybody can see
12 it before it really goes out to DOS.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We'll have it
14 tomorrow.

15 CLERK SADELI: I'll scan it in as
16 soon as I get it from Bob.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Good. Okay.
18 We're going to be appointing an acting
19 Village Clerk. As many of you know,
20 our current Village Clerk will be away
21 for about 12 weeks while she's
22 recovering and bonding with her new
23 baby. Angela is due on May what?

24 CLERK SADELI: 13th.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: 13th. And so

1 she'll be out for 12 weeks, and just
2 like when she had Santino, her last
3 baby, we survived. It was not easy by
4 the way, but we survived with a Deputy
5 Clerk. We're going to appoint --
6 what's her name, Ang?

7 CLERK SADELI: Carlin -- I can't
8 think of her last name right now.
9 Memory lapse. Carlin -- I'll look it
10 up.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe, do we have
12 to pass a resolution?

13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes, you'll make
14 two appointments. One is for Carlin to
15 be the Acting Clerk, and the other is
16 for Claire Vegliante to be the Deputy
17 Clerk.

18 CLERK SADELI: We did that last
19 time. We have to do it again every
20 time?

21 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, you don't
22 have to do it again. I didn't realize
23 you did it the last time.

24 CLERK SADELI: We did it, yeah, in
25 2019. Gary and I went back and looked

1 at the resolutions.

2 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yeah, but that
3 appointment was for one year, so we do
4 need to do it again.

5 CLERK SADELI: Carlin Powers.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Give Joe -- Joe,
7 do you have the name?

8 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes, Carlin
9 Powers.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That's the
11 same person that did it last time?

12 CLERK SADELI: No, she moved to
13 South Carolina.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So the
15 resolution will appoint her as the
16 Acting Deputy Clerk, Claire will become
17 the Acting Clerk, Angela will become
18 the Acting Treasurer for the year.

19 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I think if I
20 could just -- so what I recommend you
21 do is Carlin Powers become the Acting
22 Clerk and that Claire become the Deputy
23 Clerk.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. Okay.
25 Whatever way you want to do it.

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We need a motion
2 approving the Mayor's appointments,
3 those two appointments by Mayor
4 Vegliante.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Angela should
6 become the Deputy Treasurer as well.

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'll make it.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Gary made a
9 motion, John seconded. All in favor?

10 (Aye said in unison.)

11 None opposed. And that's also
12 Angela becomes the Deputy Treasurer, so
13 it's three appointments.

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's just to
16 cover everybody. That's for a year.

17 CLERK SADELI: We did that last
18 time too.

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. Do we
20 have Charles on the phone? Do we have
21 him on the phone, Ang?

22 CLERK SADELI: Yeah, we do.

23 MR. ATANASIO: Hello. Can you
24 hear me?

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, we can hear

1 you fine. We hear you terrific.
2 Charles and I have been talking for the
3 last several weeks. Charles has a
4 terrific idea about trying to provide
5 shared services for the oil, gas, et
6 cetera, so I'm going to give the floor
7 to Charles for a few minutes, and you
8 can provide us with the information you
9 have. We as a Village Board will
10 support you any way we can. Go ahead,
11 Charles.

12 MR. ATANASIO: Thank you. This is
13 Charles Atanasio, I'm at 747 Dune Road,
14 the fat guy with the pond. The reason
15 I was speaking with Gary, unfortunately
16 I'm embarrassed to say I really never
17 looked at bills. I don't -- I don't do
18 that, but I did happen to look at a
19 couple of bills only because I needed
20 some pipes done for gas in my house,
21 and I called the guy up that I use, and
22 he said sure, I'll come over. He comes
23 over and he gives me an estimate. I
24 said okay, and it just so happens that
25 I saw this ad on TV and I said well,

1 maybe I'll see what he'd charge me. I
2 never did that before. And the guy
3 that I was with for three years -- I
4 don't know how many years doing my
5 propane he wanted to give me 5,200
6 dollars, the other guy gives me 1,200
7 dollars. I know, you know --

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Welcome to the
9 Hamptons.

10 MR. ATANASIO: I said to myself
11 how much is he charging me for my gas?
12 Well, to make a long story short I got
13 completely ripped off. Completely. So
14 I called up a couple of buddies on the
15 road here and I said what are you
16 paying? They told me. I said I got a
17 guy that's giving me this. And they go
18 you're kidding me? I said no. So I
19 said to myself I'm sick and tired of
20 people thinking because I live on Dune
21 Road I should pay more. So I said to
22 Gary why can't we use this beautiful
23 Village or ours, and get everybody
24 together, whoever wants to, and see if
25 we can get a group of people and we get

1 some people to do some bidding on some
2 of these services that all of us use
3 because I can guarantee you this:
4 Nobody pays the same price for
5 anything. So I think that maybe we
6 might want to -- if there's interest,
7 okay, if people are interested I'll put
8 some resources behind it for free and
9 try to get this community to get what
10 we really deserve, a fair price with
11 reputable people. Gary had mentioned
12 something about gas, I mean, it can go
13 right down the line from I have three
14 guys give me bids on a roof ranging
15 from 18,000 to 40,000, same thing. I
16 think we probably all know that no one
17 really knows what the prices are for
18 any of this crap we use to keep this
19 community together as far as making our
20 houses presentable or just as
21 importantly keeping them where they
22 work for our families. I think if we
23 all put our resources together and get
24 a coalition, you know, of as many
25 people as we can, and we do some

1 outsourcing bids, and we do it where
2 it's legit, we get reputable people.
3 Of course, if anybody has anybody that
4 they want to -- they want to recommend,
5 the more the merrier. And we do a
6 closed bid or a way that we know that
7 we're getting the best bid on everybody
8 to be able to use with a reputable
9 person that we can trust and know we've
10 got some references on. So basically
11 I'm sick of getting ripped off. Gary,
12 if you can -- I don't have a computer.
13 If you can figure a way to see if there
14 is some interest with people on the
15 block. I remember at one point there
16 was about 300 of us. With 300 people,
17 give or take, we have a lot of buying
18 power. And I think if we use it in the
19 right way, fair way, legitimate closed
20 bids we might be able to save a lot of
21 people a lot of money because when I
22 changed to my propane guy I'm going to
23 save 7 to 10,000 dollars a year. God
24 knows what it's costing me to paint and
25 everything else I've done. So again,

1 Gary, if you want to put a little
2 e-mail -- I don't have e-mails. If you
3 want to put an e-mail out to everybody
4 and see who's interested. Like I said,
5 I'll support it. I'll make sure that
6 it doesn't cost the town anything, and
7 we get something that's really good for
8 everybody. That's my story, ladies and
9 gents.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think you
11 have a wonderful, wonderful idea, and I
12 have been following a propane issue
13 here for sometime with price increases,
14 and right now Paraco seems to control
15 the market, which they do, I think.
16 Who is the propane company that has
17 given you the cheaper price?

18 MR. ATANASIO: Propane something
19 or other. They were on TV. I was
20 using -- it was crazy what he did.
21 Absolutely crazy.

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: If we can have
23 the ability to have another guy come
24 in. I think 99.9% uses Paraco because
25 the company was sold from the original

1 guy. Gary, what was his name?

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, they
3 consolidated a lot of --

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Island
5 Propane. Island Propane flipped is
6 company to Paraco, and Paraco is a
7 monster on Long Island between Nassau
8 and Suffolk. It went up severely also
9 this year, I mean, a lot had to do with
10 the weather. I think that Paraco
11 created a monopoly.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They did.

13 MR. ATANASIO: Guys and girls, I
14 think it's like that with everything.
15 I think the trash guys are the same
16 way. I think everybody, landscapers,
17 everybody. We just don't know what the
18 hell we're really doing. How do we
19 know how much it costs to do
20 landscaping? We have no clue.

21 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That's right.
22 But the issue with Paraco is they seem
23 to have created a monopoly because they
24 have bought every small company --
25 almost every small company, and even if

1 they haven't bought them, they need to
2 buy their propane from Paraco. That's
3 how I understand it.

4 MR. ATANASIO: Listen, listen,
5 listen, listen, listen, that's all BS.
6 I went through that. I went through
7 the whole thing about who buys it from
8 who, who is the guy that -- it's all
9 bullshit. I'm telling you. They all
10 lie, they all lie. I'm telling you
11 it's a bunch of lies.

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Listen,
13 listen, I'll follow this thing without
14 a doubt. If you can just tell me the
15 name of the propane company, that will
16 help us.

17 CLERK SADELI: Everybody has to
18 speak one at time because I think Amy
19 is struggling.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. As a
21 municipality, we're limited as to how
22 much we can actually be involved
23 because -- right, Joe, we're really
24 not --

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We can't be
2 endorsing individual contractors, but
3 we can help facilitate this so that our
4 residents know there's a resource
5 and --

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, that's
7 better than what they have.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: And we really as
9 a Village, we can only help facilitate
10 it, we really can't do -- we can't be
11 the lead on this. So Charles --

12 MR. MERLO: I'm not a board
13 member, I'm just an owner here, but
14 can't we put out, like, an RFP and just
15 put a request for a bid?

16 CLERK SADELI: No.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I don't
19 understand why we can't do that if we
20 can do that with --

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe will
22 explain.

23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I have a couple
24 of ideas. I think that Charles raised
25 a really good point, and I have a

1 couple ideas about a structure that,
2 you know, I could recommend, so I'll do
3 that with the Village and see if
4 there's any -- if we follow up with any
5 interest.

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: This Paraco is
7 out of control.

8 MR. ATANASIO: They're all out of
9 control, I'm telling you because if
10 Paraco goes up, they all go up. They
11 know what they're doing.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Of course.

13 MR. ATANASIO: It's stupid, it's
14 stupid, and we have no choice. I'm
15 telling you what, I saved 7 to 10,000
16 dollars and I didn't use Paraco, I know
17 Paraco. As a matter of fact, Paraco
18 was --

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You don't know
20 who you're using?

21 MR. ATANASIO: Gary, I can't
22 remember my last name.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Look, the names
24 don't matter.

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You'll figure

1 it out, right?

2 MR. ATANASIO: All you got to do
3 is just tell me how many people you
4 want to get in the game, and I'll do
5 all the leg work, and I'll get three
6 people, and I'll have them bid on 300
7 people. What else do you need to know?

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's right.
9 Okay, Charles. We'll put it all
10 together for him, and Joe, you'll give
11 us the framework that we can work in,
12 and Charles and I will figure it out.

13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Okay.

14 MR. ATANASIO: Great. Thanks,
15 guys. Listen, we have a really good
16 thing going on here, and there's no
17 reason not to take advantage of what we
18 really deserve, and that's just to be
19 treated fairly.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Exactly,
21 exactly.

22 MR. ATANASIO: That's all we're
23 really trying to do. Listen, it costs
24 money for gas, I get it, but the
25 difference between what I was paying

1 and what I'm paying now, I mean, that's
2 just --

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's obscene.

4 MR. ATANASIO: Listen, everybody
5 says inflation, it's legalized
6 stealing, that's what going on,
7 gentlemen. Everybody is stealing from
8 everybody because nobody really knows
9 really what it's costing anymore.
10 That's the problem.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Sure. I
12 appreciate all you're doing, and we'll
13 get this together, and by next month
14 we'll have something that we can
15 present and explore it and see how far
16 we can go.

17 MR. ATANASIO: I really appreciate
18 the support, Mayor, because, you know,
19 getting this thing right is really good
20 for everybody.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Of course.
22 There's no downside to it.

23 MR. ATANASIO: Very good. I beat
24 the horse enough.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'm glad I run

1 into you at lunch all the time.

2 MR. ATANASIO: How come you don't
3 pay for my bill?

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You won't let
5 me.

6 MR. ATANASIO: I'll let you.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. You got
8 it. Next time.

9 MR. ATANASIO: I'm only kidding.
10 Thank you, Mayor. I appreciate your
11 help. Thank you.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. It says
13 -- it's on the agenda.

14 CLERK SADELI: It's on the agenda
15 because we have to deny the --

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We deny all but
17 one -- motion to accept the assessments
18 as they've been completed last month,
19 right, Joe?

20 ATTORNEY PROKOP: It's a motion to
21 deny the applications for the grievance
22 applications that were filed, except
23 for one, which was approved.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Do we have to
25 name the ones?

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: They're named in
2 a written resolution.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So all we have
4 to do is make the motion?

5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Motion?

7 Michael. Seconded by Gary.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yup.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor?

10 (Aye said in unison.)

11 None opposed.

12 The intern, we did that already.

13 Oh, no, the intern. Oh, God. We've
14 been thinking about getting an intern
15 for the Village to work with
16 Westhampton Beach School District.

17 John Eff has been working and Mike has
18 been working on it, but I think in
19 light of this year's budget and the
20 fact that we have some extraneous costs
21 with the temporary clerk coming in and
22 also someone in the Building Department
23 -- we'll talk a little bit about that
24 in a little while -- I don't think
25 there's room in the budget for an

1 intern, I'm sorry to say. I think it's
2 a great idea, but also the timing is
3 not right. We went to various
4 departments in the Village and nobody
5 had a real need. We're going to put
6 together something but --

7 TRUSTEE EFF: We have a need and
8 there was some interest in the Building
9 Department, and there's probably some
10 -- a very good case to make for the
11 Building Department, things that are
12 going on. Anyway.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think the need
14 in the Building Department was more
15 identified now as need for a reviewing
16 engineer or an architect.

17 TRUSTEE EFF: Right.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We've retained
19 one. So I think for an intern I think
20 by next year we'll have -- we'll be in
21 better shape and they could help more
22 with the filing in the Building
23 Department, but I think we had to focus
24 on getting an engineer to help oversee
25 a lot of the issues -- not that we have

1 issues, but the issues that are coming
2 up, and we're starting to think in
3 terms of getting a -- kind of, like,
4 another building inspector working with
5 Bob to get acquainted with our
6 department so that when Bob decides to
7 retire -- this is the way we worked Bob
8 in when Herb was with us. When Bob
9 decided to retire, the deputy building
10 commissioner comes in and is up to
11 speed. And that's going to add a
12 significant cost to our budget, I think
13 we put a line item, what did we put
14 about 20,00 in the Building Department?

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, 19
16 something.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We had to put
18 almost 19,000 dollars into the Building
19 Department budget to accommodate the
20 need of both of these people. So I
21 think for this year it seems as though
22 there's not much financial room for an
23 intern as well as physical room because
24 our office is really small, but I think
25 that we'll have to table that until

1 next year.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Wait a minute.

3 Have we even interviewed an intern?

4 And it doesn't necessarily have to be
5 from Westhampton High School, it could
6 be from a college, but have we
7 interviewed anybody?

8 TRUSTEE EFF: No.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think we
11 should run the gamut. I mean, listen,
12 right now you're spending two-thirds of
13 what the current pay is for the
14 existing building inspector to bring in
15 a new building inspector. So instead
16 of 30, it's going to be 20 plus the 30
17 for a while. So, I mean, why don't we
18 -- I mean, why don't we -- I don't
19 know, I mean, I think we should
20 interview some of these guys. Like I
21 said, if it can't be from Westhampton
22 High School, maybe it can be from a
23 college or something.

24 TRUSTEE EFF: Well, what I did
25 today, Gary, Gary Vegliante, after we

1 spoke today I called Rob Finn over at
2 Westhampton Beach High School just to
3 let him know that we're considering
4 certain things, give them better timing
5 on it, and so forth, and he reiterated
6 to me -- and we discussed how this
7 would work, and I agree with Gary
8 Trimarchi. I mean, I think we really
9 got to do planning here for the future.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I agree.

11 TRUSTEE EFF: I don't think an
12 intern would cost us that much, quite
13 frankly. They're not here for a full
14 year, they're here for a portion, a
15 small portion of the year, and I think
16 personally I think it's going to be a
17 needed support to the changes that are
18 going to go on in the Building
19 Department and -- but anyway, that's --

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I agree with
21 you, but I don't think that maybe at
22 this level a high school guy can give
23 us as much input as a guy that's in
24 college.

25 TRUSTEE EFF: That could very well

1 be.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: And is
3 studying the trade. Not that I don't
4 want to give Westhampton High School
5 all of the advantages that we have, but
6 we need to be smart about it I think,
7 and I think that if we interviewed some
8 colleges that, you know, are -- these
9 college kids dying for interns, dying.
10 Maybe we'll strike something that can
11 help support, you know, the building
12 inspector.

13 TRUSTEE EFF: What we can do is we
14 can leave it open such that we can
15 interview a couple of college students
16 and even Westhampton Beach High School
17 and see what the best opportunity is.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think we have
19 to focus on the impact to the budget.

20 TRUSTEE EFF: No, I'm not saying
21 that we shouldn't. That clearly is
22 important, but you know, we also have
23 to plan for the future.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, yes.

25 TRUSTEE EFF: The Building

1 Department has been sorely needed of
2 help in that area. I don't mean
3 just --

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, I agree.
5 I mean, listen, we're not talking about
6 spending a tremendous amount of money
7 here. We can squeeze a few bucks in,
8 we can. We've always squeezed a few
9 bucks in here and there when we needed
10 it. It's not a lot money you're
11 talking about. This is not tens of
12 thousands, fives of thousands. It's
13 minimal money that if it can help us
14 make a transition, that will be good.

15 TRUSTEE EFF: As we put the budget
16 together for discussion, maybe we can
17 see where we can pull some bucks.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. As you
19 know, we're going to have the budget
20 meeting on April 8th, which is a Friday
21 evening, and it's going to be at Joe's
22 office. And that will be an open
23 meeting to anyone who wants to attend.
24 It's a riveting meeting, if anyone
25 wants to. If you can't get to sleep

1 that night, it will help, but you're
2 welcome to come.

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Claire, you're
4 on the hot spot again.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes. Well,
6 speaking of the budget report now, the
7 budget right now is right to the bone.
8 We have it really -- we've really
9 worked to keep everything -- you got to
10 realize, I mean, look at the cost
11 expenses that have gone up this year.
12 We anticipated gas to be almost 40%,
13 50% more in total cost than last year.
14 That's a huge cost and a great deal of
15 change. And the salaries, you know,
16 there's been a big change in the law
17 enforcement aspect of our budget, and
18 so there's been some very significant
19 cost changes, and you know, we really
20 worked hard to keep the budget tight.

21 The Governor's legislative
22 initiative, as you know, last time I
23 reported that Governor Hochul had an
24 all out assault on us as villages and
25 we turned it back when she was going to

1 end the single family home issue, and
2 we successfully at NYCOM stopped that,
3 however, it is still part of the annual
4 legislative agenda, so the legislature
5 I don't believe will have -- will take
6 this on because they realize the amount
7 of resistance they felt from the
8 village governments and city
9 governments, so I think we're safe
10 where that's not going happen, but we
11 have to stay ever vigilant on that
12 because it seems as though the State
13 government keeps passing costs onto the
14 Village -- villages and cities -- with
15 very little, if any, support where, you
16 know, municipal aid has gone down, AIM
17 funding and of course, you know, the
18 road CHIPS money -- CHIPS money stayed
19 the same, but AIM money has gone down,
20 so we're fighting a fight on every
21 level. But I think we've done well.
22 Claire will report on the budget as of
23 today, but this is only preliminary.
24 We'll be doing it up and going over it
25 as a Board before April 8th, and then

1 on April 8th we'll present the final
2 budget.

3 Plover access. I know there's
4 been a lot of conversation about plover
5 access, and the preliminary fencing
6 will occur early in April, and we've
7 always asked the residents if you have
8 a special need or a special
9 accommodation you made, give it to us,
10 and we'll present it to the Fish and
11 Wildlife. And I want to be very clear
12 about this: We as a Village have
13 absolutely no authority to change any
14 of the string fencing. So the Fish and
15 Wildlife Department along with the DEC
16 come out, they decide where the fencing
17 is, we navigate for certain -- for any
18 of our residents that have a special
19 need, if there's a walkway that's too
20 far away from their home, but there's
21 very little -- we have very little
22 ability to change what they do. So
23 what we do is we try to keep a cordial
24 relationship so we can influence them,
25 and they often times try to help us,

1 but sometimes it's just impossible once
2 the bird sits down and creates a nest.
3 So there's very little we can do, but
4 we will advocate as fervently as we
5 have in the past. Most times we've
6 been somewhat successful, but please
7 just let us know, and we'll be sure to
8 convey your interests and
9 accommodation, and we'll see. I hope
10 that answers the question.

11 Okay. Joe, we're going to have to
12 get a bond on 656 and the Village
13 Improvement District. We need two
14 bonds. Is that what that's for,
15 Angela?

16 CLERK SADELI: It was Claire's
17 item.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I'm sorry?

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Why two?

20 CLERK SADELI: That's something
21 Claire had spoke about.

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: -- and one for
23 the associated work, yes?

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Wait a minute.

25 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Actually I

1 wanted to get an estimate as to when
2 and how much we wanted to get a bond
3 for for the constable's building and
4 for the Village Improvement District.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They're two
6 separate issues.

7 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Two separate
8 issues.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Well, there's
10 three separate issues here.

11 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: There are
12 two separate issues, but if we bond
13 them together, which the bond council
14 recommends, we get better rates.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: But there's
16 three issues, not only two.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What's the third
18 issue?

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There is the
20 VID, there is the modular factory, and
21 there's the associated work with
22 constructing the building.

23 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: But it's all
24 in one.

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, it's not.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, it is.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You're only
3 going to get one number from the
4 modular factory.

5 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Add that to
6 whatever --

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's true, but
8 we're talking about bonding it, we're
9 talking about paying for it.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right.

11 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We have to
12 get an estimate for the building of the
13 house, whatever the estimate is for the
14 house itself, whatever it is to prepare
15 it and everything, that's one bond
16 issue for the constables, so that's
17 what we need. We have to get an
18 estimate on that amount.

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You're going
20 to combine the cost of the modular home
21 with the associated cost to finish the
22 building?

23 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yes, it's
24 all one item.

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay. I

1 didn't know that.

2 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We need an
3 estimate as to how much you want and
4 when do you need it? Because bonding
5 takes a little while to get, so that's
6 why --

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Then we have
8 to first wait to hear from Maria on the
9 increase based upon three years of, you
10 know, we haven't built the building.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's
12 irrelevant to us. The real problem
13 is --

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You need a
15 bond number.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, we can get
17 an idea, that's right.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We can get a
19 specific idea. We can get a specific
20 number from her. She's going to submit
21 it hopefully the beginning of the week.

22 CLERK SADELI: Can she do that?

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, of
24 course she can.

25 CLERK SADELI: Well, I mean, she

1 submitted a bid and we approved it
2 based on the price that she gave us.

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Well, Joe or
4 one of the attorneys would have to read
5 the contract and see if they have the
6 right to increase over based upon, you
7 know, increase --

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Whether they
9 have the right to do it or not, we may
10 not have the right to approve it.
11 We're bound by municipal law. Joe, you
12 got to look to see what we can do. We
13 have to know how much it is, if it's
14 inconsequential, that's one thing, but
15 if it's a substantial number we may be
16 in a real jam.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I could be
18 wrong, but I don't think it's going to
19 be a very substantial number.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's nice. I
21 really -- I certainly hope you're
22 right.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think, I
24 think. I'm guessing. It's such a
25 small building.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I agree. Gary,
2 you're making a great argument, but we
3 agree.

4 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: The other
5 thing is when do you think you're going
6 to need this payment? Is it payment up
7 front, is it payment on delivery?

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There is
9 payment details in the contract that we
10 signed.

11 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Well, that's
12 what we have to look into.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We have to look
14 at that, Joe.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: You have it,
16 you have it.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We're going to
18 have to look at that, Joe.

19 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes, okay.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So that we can
21 figure out when we're going to bond it.

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Why is the
23 Village Improvement District on here?
24 I thought that knew the amount for
25 that, and I thought that we already

1 bonded that out?

2 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, we
3 bonded the first portion. This is the
4 next section. They're only putting the
5 permits in now. It won't be ready to
6 go until the fall, and the estimate I
7 think is somewhere around 400,000.
8 That much I know, but the idea is if
9 we're going to put them together we
10 need to get the other information.

11 TRUSTEE CRAIG: If I can, those
12 two bonds don't belong together. We
13 can't comingle a Village Improvement
14 District that's being paid for by
15 residents --

16 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We're not
17 co-mingling anything. It's just the
18 idea we get two separate bonds --

19 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We can't -- two
20 separate bonds, Claire, may be running
21 simultaneous, but it cannot be one
22 bond.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: It cannot be
24 what, Michael, it cannot be what?

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: You cannot have

1 one bond covering two completely
2 different projects.

3 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay. Well,
4 then you know what, it's above my pay
5 grade.

6 CLERK SADELI: Guys, the
7 stenographer can't hear and she stopped
8 typing because you're all talking over
9 each other.

10 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay. Let me just
11 finish. If Noah said that he doesn't
12 understand the scope of both projects
13 and he doesn't understand where the
14 money is coming from, I understand the
15 efficiency of it, but it can't be done.
16 And then the other practical matter is
17 if it's not being done until the fall,
18 that's, what, six months away? So
19 those prices are going to move on that
20 project. Whether it was already
21 estimated or not, those numbers are
22 going to change just like this house is
23 changing. So it's nice to have our
24 ducks in a row ready to go, but until
25 we have the permits and the timeline

1 set for the beach, and until we have
2 permits for the building we really
3 can't -- this is all just an exercise
4 in estimation.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: The numbers
6 for the beach are in already.

7 TRUSTEE CRAIG: It doesn't matter.
8 Those numbers will change between now
9 and the fall just like every other
10 number.

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That's how
12 long we expect to take to get the
13 permit for the replenishment?

14 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I don't think we
15 know. The permits are filed. We don't
16 know when we're going to.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think that
18 we should --

19 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, no, no.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think we have
21 the permits.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Mike, Mike,
23 I think Aram did put -- yeah, he put
24 them all together. He put an estimate
25 even with escalation.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, that's
2 only an estimate.

3 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: The only
4 thing I was asking about the
5 constable's building is because if
6 we're going to need payment in six
7 weeks or eight weeks or whatever it is,
8 it's going to take that time to get the
9 bond.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We got to get
11 the numbers in, Gary.

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There's one
13 person that's holding us up on that and
14 that's called the Department of State.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: I get that,
16 but I just want everything to be
17 coordinated as any way we can do it.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Look, as fast
19 as we can get their approval that's
20 only as fast as we can move.

21 CLERK SADELI: Get us an idea on
22 how much the increase is going to be.
23 That doesn't have to --

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: She said that
25 she's going to e-mail you that, Angela.

1 I said that. I expect that to come in
2 Monday or Tuesday.

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Can I just ask one
4 more question? If we've got a
5 preliminary number or a number that was
6 there, there must be some pay schedule
7 that's there. So if the number is 150
8 and she wanted 10% --

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We have a pay
10 schedule.

11 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Okay. So if it's
12 15,000 based on what we know, we must
13 have that money somewhere.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We do.

15 TRUSTEE CRAIG: So we can cover
16 that and then create time to bond it.
17 Bonding is going to take, what, Claire,
18 four weeks, five weeks tops?

19 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, no, no,
20 it takes about eight, ten weeks because
21 we have to advertise in so many areas.
22 We have to get resolutions.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Once we get an
24 answer from the modular company we can
25 proceed with the bonding.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. We need
2 the numbers, and if she gets us the
3 numbers by tomorrow or Monday --

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yeah, I'm
5 going to lean on her. I'll call her.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: You have to.
7 And she better make it --

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'll call her
9 tomorrow and say send me these things.
10 She can do it. She's pretty quick with
11 responding.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Good. All
13 right. All right. Trustees.

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Joe, Joe, you
15 need to really read the contract to
16 make sure that they have the right to
17 increase the prices.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't know if
19 they do.

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right. I
21 don't know if they do either.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: There probably is
23 some date that they put in there to
24 protect themselves against --

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I would think,

1 Michael, yes, you're right. Let's see.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe, you read
3 the contract and let us know tomorrow
4 or the day after. We have to be
5 prepared for what it's going to be.

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: They're going to
7 hammer us.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: No, I don't
9 think they're going to hammer us.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Then they don't
11 get the job, they have to rebid it.
12 They have to rebid it, that's all there
13 is to it. We're not at liberty to just
14 spend money without being -- you know,
15 they want to bid, they got to maintain
16 it.

17 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I don't think
18 that companies like this, these large
19 companies like this, I don't think they
20 do billions of dollars, but they do
21 hundreds of millions of dollars are
22 looking to capitalize on --

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It's a thousand
24 square foot building.

25 TRUSTEE CRAIG: We have a Board

1 member that so far hasn't spoken on
2 this, but I would think he would be
3 able to weigh in on the inflationary
4 costs of building. Harvey, what
5 does -- building costs have to be up
6 50%.

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There's a way
8 different cost of building in upstate
9 New York, and that's where the
10 advantage of a modular company comes
11 into play.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We can talk
13 about this all day long. The answer
14 will be given to us when she gives us
15 the number. Simple.

16 TRUSTEE GESSIN: We could really
17 be up 20% easy.

18 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Easy. That's a
19 real number.

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I think that's
21 too high, but we'll see.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. 26
23 grand, I mean --

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We're
25 guessing, we're all guessing. Let's

1 see what happens.

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. All
3 right. Okay. What else do you guys
4 want to talk about? Trustees, you're
5 on. Do you have anything else you want
6 to talk about? No? Okay.

7 The treasurer is up. So if you
8 think my end was fun --

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Saving time for
10 the treasurer. We're giving all our
11 time to Claire.

12 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Okay. So we
13 had a fun day today because the program
14 that we're using for the budget is not
15 helping.

16 CLERK SADELI: Sorry, Claire. I
17 didn't know Gary was going to move the
18 computer because the stenographer needs
19 to see your face.

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: By the way,
21 Gary and Joe, when you're looking at
22 this contract, there's also the
23 associated cost of not just for Maria
24 but the set crew. So you got to
25 remember that. We have some rough

1 numbers in there from those days, but
2 they have to be reviewed also with
3 Maria because she's supplying the set
4 crew to us. That's the crane, the
5 dropping of the house, all that other
6 shit.

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, all right.
8 What were you saying, Ang?

9 CLERK SADELI: Just that I didn't
10 know if you were going to turn the
11 camera because it's easier for the
12 stenographer when she sees Claire.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: She's on it now.

14 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We had a fun
15 day today. Anyway the budget is
16 intact. Tentative budget is out. I
17 think it's really, really good. We're
18 under the 2% tax cap, but we don't
19 know, we're very, very close, so we
20 still have to pass the cap, just in
21 case.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We passed that
23 already.

24 CLERK SADELI: Not yet.

25 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, tonight.

1 We should have, but we didn't. In any
2 event, the tax rate will stay just
3 about the same. So I think we've done
4 very, very, very well. Right now the
5 tentative budget, that's the way it
6 reads. So we'll review that, the Board
7 will review it, and then we have the
8 budget meeting on the 8th. I've sent
9 all the bank statements,
10 reconciliations, profit and loss and
11 everything to the accountant,
12 attorneys, and Trustees. What else?

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Claire, I
14 think you should be the person that
15 represents the Village of Southampton
16 too and their clerk. They don't see
17 things the same way you do.

18 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We're still
19 waiting for the completed finalized
20 audit from Nawrocki and Smith. That
21 should be in very, very soon. There's
22 an item of a BAND that we have to pay
23 and --

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's a bond
25 anticipation note.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: And there's
2 a renewal, you pay part of it now, and
3 there's a renewal for next year that
4 would be about 35,000. We have the
5 funds in the reserve funds, so explored
6 it with the accountant, and I just
7 spoke to Joe as well. We may be able
8 to pay that this year and save some
9 money because it's an item for 36,000,
10 nobody even wants to bid it.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We would be
12 paying off a bond a little over a year
13 early, which is great, and avoiding
14 9,000 dollars in costs by just not
15 having to renew it. So it's a savings
16 to the Village, and it's through the
17 opportunity we have because of the
18 leadership and hard work of our Board
19 and staff that we have that kind of
20 surplus.

21 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah,
22 because it was my idea.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: It was also
24 Claire's idea. But it's a great idea
25 and it will save us money.

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Other than
2 that, everything is in great shape.
3 The funds are right where they should
4 be, everything is on track. If anyone
5 has any questions, give me a call.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

7 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Any
8 questions now?

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Hold the
10 questions until the end. Okay.

11 Constables, you guys there?

12 SERGEANT HENNIG: We're here,
13 Gary. It's that time of year. We got
14 all our training lined up, and what was
15 really neat this year is one of the
16 guys that Tim and I have working for us
17 is actually certified to do the first
18 aid CPR, so that's saving us quite a
19 bit of money and it's much more
20 convenient because he's able to do that
21 in-house, so that's a great thing. Tim
22 has done an amazing job with the
23 schedule for the summer. We're all --
24 everything is all set for the whole
25 entire summer. We have everything

1 lined up, and we look good. Tim, do
2 you have anything to add?

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What's going
4 on with the Judge?

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: He's great.
6 Time?

7 OFFICER TURNER: Judge Gomeran is
8 very good. Joe can speak more to it,
9 but we're looking forward to our April
10 court date coming up very soon.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We really didn't
12 make -- didn't do well with the court
13 last year. We didn't have that many
14 paid violations, so we have to really
15 -- we didn't have court that much
16 either because of COVID. You know,
17 coming off of COVID hurt us on every
18 level. But the judge has been terrific
19 as far as his efficacy for the Village
20 and its regulations.

21 SERGEANT HENNIG: Gary, I guess
22 we'll just open back up for questions.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay.

24 Joe, you're up. The Village
25 Attorney report.

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So I wasn't able
2 to interject in the discussion
3 previously regarding the building
4 costs, but in April of 2021 we signed
5 an agreement with a company called
6 Custom Builder Systems for the
7 construction of the new constabulary.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That was April
9 of --

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: That agreement
11 provides that the manufacturer -- if
12 there's delays that increase the cost
13 of the production that are not the
14 fault of the manufacturer, the
15 manufacturer can pass along those
16 increase in costs. I think that it's
17 fair to say that some of the delays in
18 this case were probably attributable to
19 the manufacturer and the way that this
20 was handled at the Department of State,
21 but that will be a discussion that
22 we'll have with Maria.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I agree with
24 you, Joe.

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: A couple of

1 things on my --

2 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Joe, Joe, it was
3 April of '21?

4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: April of '21,
5 yes.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Okay. That's
7 important to know.

8 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So a couple of
9 things on my report, regarding the New
10 York State Department of State, we're
11 still putting together the data that we
12 need on -- that they requested and that
13 we feel that is appropriate to respond
14 to regarding data on tanks and --
15 propane tanks and also some
16 construction design information that
17 was requested. We're -- it's taking a
18 while to get together because we're
19 trying to -- for each property that's
20 involved we're trying to get exactly
21 the information that's available and
22 what we think is appropriate to respond
23 to them. We're not necessarily giving
24 over everything that has been requested
25 because we feel a lot of it is beyond

1 their scope of interest.

2 We do have a matter in the Village
3 regarding two properties that were
4 single and separate for many years.
5 They were single and separate at least
6 for several decades prior to the
7 formation of the Village, and a date
8 which the Suffolk County Department of
9 Health Services has indicated in its
10 regulations as significant as far as
11 recognizing properties to be single and
12 separate for purposes of issuing septic
13 system permits and approvals. In this
14 one particular case the Department of
15 Health Services is giving the Village
16 and the property owner a really bad
17 time about this, and we feel being
18 arbitrary and unfair. I believe that
19 it's in the Village's interest to --
20 although it is involving a private
21 property, it does directly impact the
22 stipulation and consent judgment that
23 we executed in the RAF matter. The
24 Department of Health Services has not
25 cooperated with the Village since the

1 beginning, and although there have been
2 spurts of cooperation, and it's
3 important to the Village and our
4 present and future owners that we let
5 that agency know that we continue to be
6 governed and we intend them to be
7 continued to be governed by the consent
8 judgment and stipulation. So it's my
9 recommendation that -- I reviewed this
10 with the outside counsel that we'd
11 typically use for things like this,
12 which is Hamburger, Maxson, and Yaffe.
13 They believe there is a basis to make
14 an application to the judge to go and
15 be heard on this at least and protect
16 our interests and also the interests of
17 the owners. So I'm asking that the
18 Village, number one, approve a retainer
19 with that law firm for that purpose.
20 They've agreed to charge a reduced rate
21 of 325 dollars an hour, which is a
22 municipal rate. Anybody that's hired
23 an attorney lately at an hourly rate
24 knows that that's a significant
25 reduction from the typical rate for an

1 excellent attorney, which they are.
2 And second thing is that I'm asking the
3 Village to authorize that application
4 to be made, that we go back and have a
5 judge look at this and see whether the
6 actions of the Suffolk County
7 Department of Health Services are
8 arbitrary or not.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Hey Joe, can I
10 ask a question about the Yaffe, the
11 fee? The 325 dollars per hour suggests
12 that we get David Yaffe himself. Who
13 makes the decision on who we get?

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The Village
15 does. So you would get either --

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'm saying we
17 go to Yaffe with something, right? We
18 say we want you to work on this,
19 meaning we want you, not -- because
20 we're paying the same price for --

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Not an
22 associate.

23 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right. So
24 when we decide that we have something
25 that's important enough to us to say to

1 Yaffe, listen, we want you on this job,
2 we want to talk to you on this job, do
3 we get that?

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

5 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

6 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Okay. That's
7 great.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I want to give
9 you some background on this.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'm not going
11 to be tough on Yaffe because I like
12 him, he's a good attorney, but there's
13 some things that we're really going to
14 need him to deal with personally.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes. We don't
16 need an associate coming in and
17 handling it.

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Right. That's
19 correct.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I want everybody
21 to understand the gravity of this issue
22 because I brought it to Joe. The Board
23 of Health has really been just
24 obstructive all the way down the line.
25 It's been almost a year that this

1 resident has been trying to resolve
2 this issue, and they just continually
3 go back to their current regulations
4 and how it doesn't fit and what the
5 regulations are. Well, the regulations
6 are meaningless because the Board of
7 Health was a party to this litigation
8 in Suffolk County and they were
9 mandated by a Court order. We insisted
10 that the judge mandate that precisely
11 this conduct wouldn't happen because we
12 know the kind of regulatory agency and
13 bureaucracy that the Board of Health
14 represents. So 30 years ago when we
15 created this act and when the judge
16 ruled on it we were very, very
17 insistent that there be a strict
18 language as to how the Board of Health
19 needs to react, and they've been
20 chipping away at this over the last 30
21 years to the point where all the people
22 that were involved in the original
23 litigation have retired out of the
24 Board of Health and you don't have that
25 institutional knowledge and the gravity

1 of what their actions are, they're
2 going right back to bureaucratically
3 regulating us out of our stip. I've
4 tried to explain to them, I've spoken
5 to them personally over and over again,
6 and they yes me to death, and as soon
7 as they hang up the phone they go right
8 back to the regulation. So it comes a
9 time where they have to understand, and
10 I think it's the fact that when a judge
11 says to them you're obligated to do
12 this or you're going to be in contempt.
13 So it's very important to our Village
14 that the genuine article, the real
15 vibrant portion of our soul as a
16 Village stays intact and they don't get
17 to undermine it. And I think they've
18 been doing it for a while, but I think
19 it's time to put them back in line.
20 Joe, I'm very much in favor, and I'm
21 glad you've gotten us a firm you feel
22 comfortable with. Do we have to
23 approve that by -- what do we need?

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So the first
25 vote would be a vote of the Board to

1 approve the retainer of Hamburger,
2 Maxson, and Yaffe.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Motion by?

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Joe, Joe, Joe,
5 before we go there, can I just ask one
6 question? So, I mean, when we talk
7 about the Department of Health, we're
8 talking about septic systems?

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Pretty much.
11 So if someone -- is existing septic
12 systems grandfathered, or if you need
13 to replace your septic system, do you
14 now have to meet current codes?

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, you have to
16 meet current codes, but if the current
17 code doesn't permit for you to fit it,
18 the Board of Health must come up with a
19 system that they will award you. They
20 can't say no.

21 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: So it's all
22 based on them and based upon what they
23 think, whatever they can do to improve
24 the system is on the homeowners'
25 responsibility. Sounds very unfair.

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, in this
2 case --

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: The majority
4 of our homes have been built before the
5 septic rules have changed.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, but Gary,
7 the current regulations apply. It's
8 just they can't say the current
9 regulations apply and there's no way
10 you can fit it on your system. We
11 can't be exempt from current
12 regulations, but if the current
13 regulations preclude you from being
14 able to build a house on a property
15 that exists.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Not even
17 building a house, I'm talking about the
18 existing --

19 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Or repair a
20 house on property that existed, they
21 can't -- the only thing we can
22 guarantee with the Board of Health is
23 that they couldn't regulate you out of
24 your home, but if you have to put an IA
25 system in, you have to put an IA system

1 in. That's a regulation for everybody
2 on Dune Road. There's nothing we can
3 do about it. It is what it is. The
4 Court order says they cannot create
5 regulations that stop you from being
6 able to build or rebuild or repair.

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Or repair.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, yes.

9 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Are we hiring
10 Yaffe to represent the Village and
11 specific homeowner? Is there a
12 specific example that I missed in here?

13 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The homeowners
14 have their own attorney. The
15 homeowners are represented by and
16 paying their own attorney. Yaffe's
17 discussion is going to be regarding the
18 stipulation, the involvement of the
19 stipulation only.

20 TRUSTEE CRAIG: In front of the
21 same judge?

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I don't know.

23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: No, the judge
24 passed away. In front of -- we're
25 hoping to get the assistant to that

1 judge, the law clerk for that judge.

2 TRUSTEE CRAIG: No, I'm saying to
3 the same judge that this one particular
4 homeowner is in front of. This is not
5 a separate court case that you're
6 bringing action, right?

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Ours is a
8 separate court case.

9 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Yes.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: The homeowner --
11 the homeowner is not litigating against
12 each other, they're moving forward with
13 a closing. It's -- and the homeowner,
14 if the homeowner chooses to litigate
15 against the Board of Health, they may,
16 but I think it would be in their best
17 interest that they wait until our case
18 be heard. Our case I think is going to
19 bring them right back into reality and
20 it's going to be fine, but it's not a
21 case that the homeowner can bring.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: So this is a
23 homeowner that's got a home with a
24 septic that's not conforming according
25 to the Health Department and it sounds

1 like they've not approved the system
2 nor they just left them in limbo?

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What happened
4 was the person buying the home in the
5 Village has applied for an updated
6 septic system because the one that was
7 there was not adequate. It was also
8 built without a permit, but that's
9 besides the point, that has nothing to
10 do with this issue. So he said look,
11 just give me my rate stamp, and I'll
12 build a septic system that you approve.
13 He's designed the septic system,
14 they've even approved the septic system
15 that he's designed, but they're
16 attempting to make him go through the
17 entire different regulatory process and
18 subdivide a property that is not --
19 that has never been divided -- that has
20 never been merged. It's a single and
21 separate lot.

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Well, that's a
23 no-brainer.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. It should
25 have been resolved in 20 minutes a year

1 ago.

2 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So what this
3 case is about, Gary, it's confusing and
4 both of you are right about what it's
5 about. The case has two issues where
6 the first issue, the Health Department
7 has two regulations, the first is that
8 if you got -- if you filed an
9 application with the Health Department
10 prior to July 1, 2021 you're not
11 required to do an IA system, okay, but
12 this person is for all intents and
13 purposes conceding the IA system, they
14 don't want to battle over that although
15 their application was filed at least a
16 year prior to that July 2021 date.
17 What is happening though is there's
18 another date which is 1980 -- in 19 --
19 I'm sorry, I forget if it's '70 or '80,
20 I believe it's 1980 --

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: 1983.

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: 1983. So in
23 order to be subdivided for Health
24 Department purposes you have to be
25 subdivided prior to 1983. So the

1 property owner involved has proven to
2 everybody's satisfaction that the
3 properties were subdivided and
4 developed in the 1950's, somewhere
5 between 1956 and 1960, and the Health
6 Department is saying we don't care, you
7 can't establish that you were
8 subdivided and also had a septic system
9 as of that prior date, so therefore
10 we're not considering you to be
11 subdivided and you have to file a new
12 application for subdivision with the
13 Suffolk County Department of Health
14 Services. The problem with that is
15 that anybody in the Village really can
16 fall into this trap. Anybody in the
17 Village that needs a new septic system,
18 say there's a storm event, in the
19 potential of a new storm event or
20 something where people lose their
21 septic systems and need to restore them
22 as an example, the Health Department
23 then could deny it saying that we now
24 consider everything in the Village to
25 be not subdivided or we consider parts

1 of the Village to be not subdivided and
2 force people to go through this process
3 all over again, which they could
4 arbitrarily enforce against us.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: There are not
6 that many -- well, I guess there are
7 quite a few properties that are
8 subdivided, but the majority of the
9 properties in the Village are not
10 subdivided, they're single properties,
11 and that's how it went.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, but what
13 Joe is saying is that if there's a
14 major storm event they could wipe the
15 map clean and say now none of these
16 properties are any longer. We don't
17 recognize subdivisions. You know, the
18 properties that we're talking about
19 have held independent and clear title
20 on individual lots with individual
21 Suffolk County Tax Map numbers.

22 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Yeah, Gary, that's
23 getting to my question, if everyone is
24 satisfied but the Health Department,
25 why is that?

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What's that?

2 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Why is the Health
3 Department not satisfied if what you're
4 saying is clearly legal and separate?

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They say no,
6 well, we really -- they're actually
7 trying to hang their hat on an
8 application that was made in 1994 where
9 the architect who designed the septic
10 system for a preexisting bungalow
11 structure just to repair had merged and
12 put part of the septic system across
13 the boundary line onto the other lot.

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: By mistake.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: By mistake.
16 They then withdrew the application
17 entirely and never went forward.

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: To correct their
19 mistake.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Never went
21 forward, just left everything the way
22 it was. The Suffolk County -- the
23 bureaucracy -- the guy who makes the
24 ruling on it in the office said well,
25 that was one lot then. They continue

1 to pay taxes on two lots. There was no
2 merger of a lot. Just because an
3 architect -- we don't even know if the
4 architect was hired by the owner
5 because I know for a fact that the
6 owner at that time was in a nursing
7 home, so I have no idea how that
8 application got proffered. The fact of
9 the matter is that that's the thinnest
10 veil of an attempt for them to keep
11 their bureaucratic agency intact, their
12 bureaucracy and their regulations
13 intact. It's an absurd attempt by them
14 to exert their authority over the
15 Village, and we're not going to stand
16 for it. The fact of the matter is I
17 think this goes in front of a judge and
18 they get whacked.

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: When we built
20 693, 691, and 689 when we did the last
21 piece of that, of those three
22 properties we were required to meet the
23 current standards.

24 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yes, yes.
25 Everybody is. That's correct.

1 ATTORNEY PROKOP: What we're
2 talking about here, Gary, Trustee Gary,
3 is that you would have to file a new
4 subdivision application. You don't
5 just agree to do the IA standard, you
6 have to file -- number one, you have to
7 file a consent judgment -- a consent
8 order.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

10 ATTORNEY PROKOP: This is the DEC
11 plan book. They've adopted -- they're
12 trying to adopt the DEC method of
13 dealing with people where they don't
14 deal with you unless you signed a
15 consent order that's signed by a judge
16 and you agree to pay a fine, a major
17 fine, like, 10,000 dollars for them to
18 even deal with you. And then they'll
19 give you the opportunity to apply for a
20 subdivision of a property that's been
21 subdivided for 62 years, and they don't
22 have to agree to that.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right. They
24 would be taking away our rights that we
25 so aggressively fought for and

1 extinguishing individual lots if they
2 want to. And by their bureaucratic
3 attitude, they want to do that. They
4 love doing it. It just can't be
5 tolerated and we need to bring it to
6 court. I don't think it will ever get
7 to court, I think they get served with
8 the papers and I think they fold
9 because when they go to their attorney
10 with this their attorney is going to
11 read it and say you got no defense.
12 There's no defense for their actions.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Harvey, you've
14 built enough houses out there. What
15 happens to a 90 foot lot that may have
16 been subdivided, how can they meet the
17 current regulations to build these huge
18 fields when they don't have the
19 property to do it?

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's where the
21 Board of Health was mandated to give
22 them a system that can fit on that
23 project. That's what we have. They
24 can't out regulate us because we're
25 afraid the regulations were never --

1 with the regulations even in '93 60% of
2 the lots would not be buildable again.
3 That's what we were afraid of, that's
4 what we protected against. What
5 they're doing in this case is going
6 above and beyond that and trying to --
7 they've stalled the sale of this
8 property for almost a year now just
9 playing regulatory ping-pong. So we
10 have to stop them from doing it. But
11 Gary, what you said is exactly why the
12 stip is enforced because regardless
13 what systems they come up with now --

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: If you take
15 the 693, the 691, and 689, those
16 properties were never subdivided. We
17 bought them together, they stayed the
18 same, but we still had to meet the
19 current code. So it's a little
20 confusing.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, it's not.
22 You have to meet the current code. If
23 you cannot meet the current code, Board
24 of Health has to design something for
25 you alone with -- they're not able to

1 say you can't meet the code on that lot
2 so you can't build it whereas everyone
3 else on Dune Road --

4 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What if it's
5 built already? Would you be able to
6 replace what's there?

7 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Absolutely.
8 You're guaranteed by the stip. They
9 cannot --

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: To replace
11 what's there?

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Absolutely
13 guaranteed.

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Well, that's a
15 big thing.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Of course it's a
17 big thing. That's what we did in 1993
18 when we won the lawsuit. We made sure
19 they would never be able to do what
20 they're trying to do on 790.

21 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Hang on. Guys,
22 Harvey is trying to speak, but Harvey,
23 you've got to take yourself off mute
24 first.

25 TRUSTEE GESSIN: We've been

1 getting denials on almost every house
2 we've built in the last three years,
3 and multiple denials until we had to go
4 into the Village, sit down with either
5 Joe Prokop or Gary, send a letter to
6 the Health Department, provide a copy
7 of the RAF agreement, which includes
8 alternate layouts that are standards
9 that are less than current standards
10 for setbacks that were approved because
11 of the undersized lots. We've also
12 gotten denials for parking on the
13 septic systems where in that agreement
14 it says that every lot in the Village
15 has to have a traffic bearing steel
16 cover.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Specifically.

18 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Specifically for
19 that reason.

20 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That was
21 always the rule, right? I have -- my
22 house was built 24 years ago.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That was when
24 the stip was in place. That was
25 because the stip was in place you were

1 able to do it. Nowhere else on Dune
2 Road can anybody do that. We can do
3 it, nobody else can because we
4 anticipated this kind of behavior and
5 it's coming to light. They're
6 scurrilous bureaucrats, they're
7 regulators, they won't give it up, and
8 so we have to -- as I said, I don't
9 believe it's going to go to trial. I
10 think they're going to get served with
11 the papers, the current Law Department
12 is going to read it and say guys, we
13 got walk on this, forget it.

14 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Gary, just so you
15 know, when we make applications now it
16 includes the RAF agreement.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah, you have
18 to. That's right. And he still -- the
19 same guy who got it from you says I
20 don't know what the agreement said. I
21 sent him the copy with the pages
22 specifically, and highlighted, and now
23 once in a while he'll agree that he
24 knows at least what it says. Then he
25 says yeah, but just do it this way, it

1 will be much easier. I said no, it
2 won't be much easier. It will be
3 another six months. That's not easy.
4 The guy wants to move into his house.
5 So we need to really -- the regulators
6 will say or do anything in order to get
7 the regulation. So --

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: How is this
9 going to effect the constabulary
10 building? Because the constabulary
11 building has one bathroom. Now I think
12 we're increasing it, right, to two
13 bathrooms.

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Well, let me
15 explain. We'll either keep the septic
16 system that's there, or if they request
17 that we put a new septic system in,
18 well, they'll have to be able to fit it
19 on the property. But my view is that
20 the septic system that's there is
21 adequate.

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I don't know
23 if it's functional because there hasn't
24 been water in it in decades.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: So what?

1 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That's how
2 they collapse.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: They don't
4 collapse.

5 TRUSTEE GESSIN: It's a concrete
6 ring.

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: And they break
8 with no water.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. If
10 it's broken, we'll see.

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We'll see what
12 happens.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right, right.
14 But one thing they can't do, they can't
15 say no, no matter what. They cannot
16 say no. That's what the stip provides
17 for, and although it's almost 30 years
18 later they're still bound by it.

19 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: They don't
20 have a lot of property to work with on
21 that little tiny lot.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's why I
23 would submit they will be intact.

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I think we were
25 about to approve the retainer.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

2 CLERK SADELI: I think Harvey
3 motioned it and John seconded.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor?
5 (Aye said in unison.)

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The next
7 resolution is a resolution authorizing
8 the Village to make an application to
9 court for enforcement of the
10 stipulation.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Motion by
12 Harvey?

13 TRUSTEE GESSIN: I'll make the
14 motion.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Second by Mike?

16 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Second.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor?
18 (Aye said in unison.)

19 None opposed.

20 Motion to adopt a resolution
21 approving the claim vouchers by the
22 Board of Trustees for the Village.
23 John?

24 TRUSTEE EFF: Yes.

25 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Seconded by

1 Gary?

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Second.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All in favor?

4 (Aye said in unison.)

5 None denied.

6 Motion to deny or approve the tax
7 grievances -- we did that, right?

8 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Yes.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Motion for the
10 tax grievances. Motion to approve an
11 acting clerk, we did that. No longer
12 than 12 weeks, that's right, we did
13 that one.

14 CLERK SADELI: Yes.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Motion to
16 approve a resolution determining that
17 the adoption of the local law
18 authorizing the Village to pierce the
19 2% cap of the General Municipal Law is a
20 Type II action for purposes of SEQRA.
21 I need a motion to exceed the 2% cap.
22 Whether we do or we don't, we'll decide
23 that next week, April 8th.

24 ATTORNEY PROKOP: This should be
25 -- at the end of this resolution it

1 should have language that says and to
2 set a public hearing on this local law,
3 and then whatever date you would like
4 to have the public hearing. It should
5 be at the April meeting.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, it will be
7 before the April meeting.

8 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We're going
9 to have the budget hearing, and then
10 we're going to end the meeting, and
11 then we're going to have the approval
12 of the budget.

13 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: At the budget
14 meeting.

15 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah.

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: April 8th. Set
17 the date. Unfortunately I know some
18 residents can't make it on a Friday,
19 that was the only day available to fit
20 into the framework of when it has to be
21 done.

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So at the end of
23 this resolution there's language that
24 says and conduct a public hearing on
25 the local law on April 8, 2022.

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: At 7:00 p.m.

2 CLERK SADELI: I added it on.

3 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: 7:00 p.m. We're
4 going to do it at 7:00, right?

5 CLERK SADELI: Right.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Motion by Mike?

7 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Sure.

8 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Seconded by
9 Harvey?

10 TRUSTEE GESSIN: Second.

11 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All approval?

12 (Aye said in unison.)

13 None opposed.

14 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Joe, do we
15 need a motion to approve the BAND?

16 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We need a motion
17 to authorize the Village Treasurer to
18 pay off the BAND that's coming due and
19 not roll it over. The amount required
20 to pay it off is 71,000 dollars plus an
21 interest payment.

22 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: I believe.

23 ATTORNEY PROKOP: And to take that
24 money from the Village reserves.

25 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Only a

1 portion of it, but yeah.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Why are we
3 paying it off?

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: To avoid the
5 cost of renewing it. In order to get
6 the BAND through it's life cycle we'd
7 have to renew it, and the cost alone of
8 renewing it is over 15,000 dollars. We
9 have the money in surplus --

10 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: In our
11 reserve.

12 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: In our reserve.

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: And we
14 budgeted for it, so in June we'll be
15 able to pay the reserve back and save a
16 lot of money.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We pay the
18 reserve back over a year early, it's a
19 big plus in our credit history, and it
20 works out well, and it saves us about
21 15,000 dollars. Somewhere around that
22 much.

23 TRUSTEE CRAIG: How much do we
24 have in our reserve?

25 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: We had 111

1 and we just made a check for 21.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What's
3 outstanding?

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Nothing. That's
5 a reserve fund. That's just the
6 reserve fund, that's extra money.

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Are we waiting
8 on any money?

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What do you
10 mean?

11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We have some tax
12 collection cases that I'm working on.

13 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, but
14 that's not in the reserve.

15 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I understand.
16 I'm just talking about money.

17 TRUSTEE CRAIG: Claire, did I hear
18 you right, 111 and you received a check
19 of 20?

20 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Wait a
21 second. Yeah, the reserve fund we have
22 111,000 and we just made a check to
23 Brant for I think it was 21,000. We
24 just made it today.

25 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: For what?

1 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: For the
2 pilings.

3 TRUSTEE CRAIG: So our reserve
4 fund is 90,000?

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Right.

6 TRUSTEE CRAIG: And you want to
7 write a check for 70?

8 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: No, I want
9 to write a check for about 35.

10 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What's the
11 number --

12 TRUSTEE CRAIG: I'm good with it.

13 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What's the
14 finish number for Brant? Because he's
15 not done.

16 TREASURER VEGLIANTE: Yeah, he's
17 done.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: He's done.

19 TRUSTEE GESSIN: No, he's not
20 done.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: He's not done
22 with the work, but his total bill was
23 21,000.

24 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: And we're
25 paying him in full?

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, that's the
2 bill that he sent to us.

3 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I didn't see
4 any of the cross members there.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, the cross
6 members are not in.

7 TRUSTEE GESSIN: He doesn't have
8 the cross members, he doesn't have the
9 knee braces in.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I know, but he
11 sent us a bill for 21,000 dollars.

12 CLERK SADELI: The line item on
13 the bill was for pilings.

14 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: What's the
15 balance after the 21 is paid?

16 CLERK SADELI: I'll have to ask
17 him.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Do we have a
19 bill?

20 CLERK SADELI: I have it here.

21 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Show the bill
22 that you have there.

23 CLERK SADELI: Hold on.

24 TRUSTEE GESSIN: I don't have it
25 in front of me, but it was somewhere

1 around 27 for the whole job.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: All right. So
3 we owe him a few more bucks, that's
4 fine.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: All right. So
6 motion?

7 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: I'll make a
8 motion.

9 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: We got it, Ang.
10 I think it's about 27,000. All right.
11 Joe, where are we at?

12 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Do you want to
13 finish this?

14 CLERK SADELI: Which one of you is
15 going to make the motion for that?

16 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: To pay Brant the
17 21,000 that he presented the bill for?

18 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: We owe him
19 about 27.

20 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Gary, are you
21 making a motion?

22 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Yes.

23 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: John, second.
24 All in favor?

25 CLERK SADELI: What was that for?

1 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: To pay Brant.

2 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Make sure that
3 there's an outstanding balance of
4 around 7,000 dollars.

5 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: What is the
6 motion being made now?

7 CLERK SADELI: It's about paying
8 the 71,000 plus interest from the
9 Village reserve account. Nobody voted
10 on it.

11 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: So that's not
12 the full bill, there's still a balance
13 left --

14 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: No, we're
15 talking about the BAND. Gary, we're
16 talking about the BAND.

17 ATTORNEY PROKOP: We approved
18 paying off the BAND, the amount has to
19 be modified from 71,000 to 36,000.

20 CLERK SADELI: Okay. And then I
21 just need the vote.

22 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: That's why we
23 should have a stenographer.

24 Motion to pay Brant the 21,000 on
25 the bill that he presented. Gary made

1 the motion.

2 TRUSTEE EFF: I'll second the
3 motion.

4 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: John second the
5 motion. All in favor?

6 (Aye said in unison.)

7 None opposed. Okay.

8 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: That's a
9 partial payment.

10 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Partial payment.
11 Right. The bill that's presented.

12 Okay. We open up the floor to
13 everybody who wants to speak, one at a
14 time, please. Wave, let Angela know
15 you have a question. Okay. Do you
16 want to go home?

17 CLERK SADELI: Sounds good.

18 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Does anybody
19 want to say anything? I can't believe
20 it. Oh, I had a conversation with Greg
21 Rinn. It seems that Greg Rinn has
22 created the paperwork for the County,
23 the County is set on the paperwork for
24 the stipulation and the walkover to the
25 ocean or walkover to the bay. The

1 County took seven or eight weeks, sent
2 it back with some minor verbal changes.
3 Greg said he approved all of the
4 changes and that there seems like the
5 County and Greg has made all their --
6 have agreed upon them all, and I think
7 after that that area will be able to
8 resolve the walkway with Dr. Wang, that
9 will be resolved, and I think we're
10 close to everything. And then I
11 believe all we need is the BBPA to
12 agree with Greg. I don't know if Greg
13 is still on the line at the meeting,
14 but as far as I know there should be no
15 problem with the BBPA.

16 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Hallelujah.

17 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: Yeah. So
18 although now the leadership of the BBPA
19 is in some kind of change, I have no
20 idea, even though I was one of the
21 founding members, I have no idea of
22 where the organization is going, but
23 I'm sure it will not be a problem. I
24 don't know why I'm sure, I'm just sure.
25 Okay.

1 So if anybody wants to speak now,
2 please do because we're here to hear
3 you. Come on. Somebody's got to have
4 something to say.

5 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Didn't we say
6 enough?

7 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Good night,
8 everybody.

9 TRUSTEE TRIMARCHI: Motion to
10 dismiss.

11 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Second.

12 CLERK SADELI: Nobody has their
13 hand up and no one has un-muted
14 themselves.

15 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: I think it's
16 terrific. Remember our budget meeting,
17 guys. We'll be talking about the
18 budget. We sent you all copies. Take
19 a look at it, see where you can make
20 any changes. I mean, it's as thin as a
21 few thousand dollars either way. It's
22 been a very big struggle because there
23 was significant changes, as I said, and
24 we had to make due with what we had,
25 but the assessment of the Village has

1 gone up by a significant amount and
2 we're blessed, so we're in good shape.
3 All right, everyone. Motion to adjourn
4 the meeting?

5 TRUSTEE EFF: I'll make a motion.

6 MAYOR VEGLIANTE: John, then Gary.

7 All in favor?

8 (Aye said in unison.)

9 Good night, everyone.

10 (Whereupon the meeting was
11 adjourned at 8:57 p.m.)
